We trust Mr. Bennett's stay in Newfoundland will be a pleasant one and that when he returns to his adopted country he will find the way clear to higher pinnacles of fame.

Supreme Court

Morgan Brothers Sentenced For House Breaking

Walter and Alexander Morgan pleaded guilty in the Supreme Court this morning to breaking into the residence of Mr. Frank Steer, Military Road, last May, for the purpose of robbery. While attempting to escape, the older Morgan hit Mr. Steer in the head with an empty bottle inflicting an ugly scalp wound.

Alexander Morgan, the older boy, was sentenced to two and a half years, and Walter received a sentence of two years, with hard labor. Jonathan Rahms, of Pouch Cove, aged 70 years, pleaded guilty to a criminal offence on a girl under 16 years of age. He was not represented by Counsel and made a statement to the Court of the circumstances surrounding his act. After consultation the Chief Justice delivered the sentence of the Court, which was that Rahms be confined in the penitentiary for two years with hard labor.

Edward Carson Gets Six Months

Edward Carson, an incorrigible youth of 17, with a record of five convictions for larceny against him, was sentenced to a term of six months imprisonment by Judge Morris this morning. On Monday morning Carson effected an entrance through a hatchway into the store of Mr. Gus Wadden, Water Street West, and stole a quantity of cigarettes and tobacco valued at \$3.75. He also looted the cash drawer of what loose change had been left in it. Carson has no home or friends, and has been sleeping under old stores and in outhouses. His last abode was under George Street church, where he spent all day Sunday.

A dispute between two neighbors over children reached court this morning, and was adjudged by the defendant in the case being fined \$1 and costs.

And Presents Military Cross and Medals.

At 11 o'clock this forenoon His Excellency the Governor, accompanied by the Hon. J. R. Bennett, Minister of Militia, visited Regimental Headquarters for the two-fold purpose of presenting military distinctions to the parents of four of our valiant boys, and to make a final inspection of the contingent which is preparing to leave for active service. Governor Davidson spoke enthusiastically of the valorous deeds which made possible the pleasing duty he was called upon to perform, and also gave some sound advice to the boys who were going forward to take the places of their brothers-in-arms. His Excellency also referred to the fact that he is soon to leave our shores, but reminded his listeners that he would always watch with pride the future action of the gallant Newfoundlanders in the field.

Mr. John J. Butler, of Topsail, father of Capt. Bertram Topsail, received the Military Cross with Barwon by his son.

Mr. Thomas Curran, father of Pte. Wilfred Curran was presented with the Military Medal won by his son for distinguished services in the action of April 14, a day memorable in the history of the Newfoundlanders. Mrs. Simon Gobbie, mother of Sgt. Arch Gobbie, and Mrs. Elizabeth Hillier, mother of Capt. John Hillier, received in the order named, from the hands of His Excellency, the Military Medals, which were bestowed on their sons for bravery in action on the battle field.

With each presentation Governor Davidson congratulated the recipients in suitable terms.

The Minister of Militia, Hon. John R. Bennett, followed in a practical speech, in which he extolled the past achievements of the Nfld. Regiment, congratulated the parents of the men whose valor was to-day being specially recognized, and expressed the confident hope that the boys now preparing to proceed overseas would maintain and add even greater lustre to the name of Newfoundland, when the time came for them to take an active part in the Empire's struggle.

Amongst those present at this morning's function were Major Montgomerie, Major Carly, Surg. Major Patterson, Capt. Clayton and a number of returned soldiers.

Cartage Rates Jump

At last night's meeting of the Truckmen's Union a lengthy discussion took place in connection with the cartage rates to the Coastal Steamship Co.'s wharves. The Car-men complain of the unnecessary delays to which carters are subjected when taking freight to these places. Two hours are sometimes lost on a single haul. The truckmen will charge at the rate of one dollar per hour, while steamers are loading. They reluctantly do this, as they have no desire to increase the rates, but they cannot submit any longer to the loss of time which work of this kind involves.
