TO FIGHT ZEPPELINS

Mr. Cody's Plan for Using Bombs Two Thousand Feet Up

Mr. Cody, London, has revealed a highly ingenious plan for fighting dirigibles of the Zeppelin type. He says: "I call my method 'fishing for the enemy,' and that is really what it is like. My device is based on the knowledge that aeroplanes can fly faster and higher than any Zeppelin, and the process has been already tested and found practicable and efficient. My plan is to fly up until my machine is one or two thousand feet above the dirigible and then to fish for them with a long, thin steel hawser, at the end of which I propose to have a bomb of my own invention. That bomb will be of a very high power and easily exploded. In fact, the least touch will fire it, and it will shoot flames in six directions at once to a distance of eight feet each. If my first 'drag' misses its mark, all I have to do is to wheel round and try again. Following after the spurts of flame there will issue from my bombs pieces of lighted tow or other material soaked in some highly inflammable spirit, which will inevitably fire any portion of the structure of the dirigible that may have escaped the first effects of the explosion. The vessel would be absolutely at the mercy of the man in the aeroplane sailing a thousand feet above it. He could trail his bomb backwards and forwards to any point. The enemy meanwhile would have nothing to aim at with their guns except the quickly-moving 'plane, and would have to fire upwards. I have seen experiments in firing from dirigibles, and I am quite sure their work would be practically useless. Suppose a Continental enemy has determined to attack us with a fleet of dirigibles, she will have to employ vessels that can keep flying for long periods. All that we require to destroy them is a fleet of aeroplanes that will keep flying for a few hours. There is a good deal of loose talk about these dirigibles of the Zeppelin type. We are told they can lift twenty-seven tons. That sounds formidable. But they have a weight of their own of twenty tons, so that their real capacity is only about seven tons. With an aeroplane of my own and a 3 pound gun I could circle round and round and above any airship I know of and fire a shot through every balloon. I have been up over 7,000 feet, and could easily get above them."

Mr. A. Nichol, of Hildebrand, Sask., disposed of his farm of 480 acres in the Hildebrand district. The purchaser is Mr. W. Thompson of Los Angeles, Cal. This farm was sold at a handsome figure and the deal was put through by Mr. Jas. R. Donaldson of Arcola.

Mr. Wm. Nichol, of the Hildebrand district, Sask., has bought out an invention which is an attachment to a binder that can be used in the cutting of tangled grain. This can be attached to any binder and he claims for it that with this attachment a binder will cut tangled grain with the same facility as standing grain.

According to Chief Enumerator C. A. Cook, and his staff of 10 assistants, who have just completed their work, the population of Weyburn totals 5,413.

The board of trade of Battleford, Sask., has placed itself on record as being well satisfied with the railway rates in western Canada, and protests against the present persecution of the railways by the rest of the west in their fight for lower freight rates.

RICH COAL FIELD FOUND IN COLORADO

Denver, July 2.—A deal whereby French and Belgian capital will advance the development of 30,000 acres of coal land in Routt County, Colorado, and construct 250 miles of railroad from Hayden to Casper, Wyoming, will be consummated here within a few days. Several foreign magnates will come here and advance \$2,000,000 to begin construction of railroad, which will open rich coal mines. Five French banks have already made contracts for \$28,000,000 worth of bonds for Yampa Fuel and Iron Company. The name of the company is Routt County Coal Corporation.

The train, which by the way is the first excursion to Winnipeg run over the C.N.R., will do the journey in four hours, and this will allow ample time to visit friends or transact business in the "Peg." The train will be made up of first-class coaches and the comfort of the passengers is assured. Superintendent W. R. Thornton, and staff of officers will accompany the train.

LADY'S "MENAGERIE"

Stockbroker Complained of Being Annoyed by His Neighbor

A further case arising out of a Sydneyham lady's domestic "menagerie" was heard at the Greenwich Police Court. Mrs. Juliette Hughes was summoned for abusing her neighbor, Mr. T. Owen, a stockbroker. Mr. Thomas, counsel for Mr. Owen, said that Mrs. Hughes kept a number of dogs and ducks and geese—quite a menagerie, in short. He read a letter which she had written to Mr. Owen, saying that he had accused her of stealing a garden hose. "You have spoiled my character," she wrote, "and children call me a French pincher." The conduct of Mrs. Hughes had become unbearable. Mr. Owen had been in his house for seventeen years, and was most anxious to stop this annoyance. Mr. Owen, sworn, said that Mrs. Hughes from her front garden called to him: "Can you smell the geese?—Can you smell the rubber burning?" There had been some words over the garden hose and some geese, and they had had to call in a sanitary inspector about the smell from the geese. He had put up with the annoyance for two years. Mrs. Hughes now said she remarked to someone in her house, "Can you smell the rubber burning?" She did not apply the remark to Mr. Owen. She admitted sending pictorial postcards to him on which she had written, "Can you smell the geese?" Mr. Hutton bound Mrs. Hughes over to keep the peace for twelve months, and ordered her to pay 50 cents costs.

STRIKE RIOT

A Lively Time at a Boot Factory in England

Owing to the introduction of outside labor during a strike at the boot factory of Messrs. Loake Brothers at Melbourne, England, a riot took place. The firm, who do not employ unionists, dismissed one man who joined the union and endeavored to persuade others to do so. Forty men handed in notices and Messrs. Loake imported five men. The others resented the introduction of such labor, and a crowd of 800 demonstrated outside the factory. Police reinforcements were hurried on to the scene, but were assailed with stones. The rioters, after smashing the factory windows, attacked the manager's house, wrecking the windows. The police made baton charges, dispersing the strikers.

right flank and force them south, the artillery to engage in front while the cavalry enveloped the right flank.

The arrangements at this year's camp for the comfort of the men are excellent, and the lines are being kept exceptionally clean and free from litter. The commissariat department is working well and no fault is being found with the ration of hay and oats and plenty at that. All in all the camp this year is the best in every respect that has ever been held in the west.

Although the parade state, made up every morning at headquarters, gives the number of men in camp as about 5500, this number only accounts for the men actually in the strength of the different units, and does not include about 200 who are unattached. It is generally admitted that there are over 6000 all told at Sewell this year.

Another Account
Sewell, July 2.—Yesterday the forces in camp were divided into two opposing armies. Active service conditions prevailed, and the force bivouaced as in actual warfare.

General Idea
The north and south line drawn midway between Harte and Douglas was the boundary between two—an eastern and western state. Hostilities have broken out between these states. The advanced troops of both states were near the common frontier but it was known that neither state could be in a position to move its main army until towards the end of the first week in July.

The Eastern plan of campaign was to detain this main army to Harte, and from there to advance west. To cover this detaining point the eastern state advanced troops considering of the 6th Cavalry Brigade, and the 1st Infantry Brigade, and push forward to arrive at Harte on the forenoon of July 1st.

The enemy were reported in the vicinity of Sewell and Douglas on June 30. The western forces were white hat bands. Each army awoke with the "Reveille" at 1 a.m. Each man was served with 20 rounds of blank ammunition for each day.

Brandon Men's Good Showing
The 99th were this morning engaged in infantry evolutions with the whole of the Brigade, and it has been universally decided upon that the Brandon contingents have never sent down a finer body of men to the camp at Sewell, than those to be found in the 12th M.D., 99th and 21st. In this connection it is interesting to note that never in the history of the camp has the weather been so unfavorable. At the same time, the men, who have undergone a drenching nearly every night since they have been here are in the best of spirits.

Ordnance Corps, No. 10 Detachment Signalling Corps, and a detachment of Canadian Postal Corps.

On Saturday the Souris squadron of the 12th Manitoba Dragoons, under Major Maxfield took up a position, the remaining 3 squadrons under the command of Major Clark had the task of locating the Souris boys, and driving them from their position. Souris, as usual, were hard to find, and when they were found, were hard to dislodge.

Colonel Young did not reveal his own opinion, but it is understood that honors were even.

A Large Spectacle

From the early hours of Sunday morning, until late at night, the camp presented a very gay spectacle. Special trains carrying soldiers, and visitors rushed in, in almost continuous procession. The soldiers cheered madly as every fresh regiment came in, and marched to their quarters, and this, with the large number of lady visitors present, created a very animated scene.

A general church parade was held all over the camp between 7:30 a.m. and 9 a.m. Among the regiments arriving was the 99th. The boys cheered like mad, to see them coming in, with the band playing "The Soldiers of the King," at the head. Their band is certainly one of the best in camp.

Prominent Visitors
The Honorable J. A. M. Atkins and

the Hon. G. R. and Mrs. Coldwell were visitors in camp, and expressed themselves delighted with all the arrangements.

Cavalry Attacks Position

Sewell, July 2.—The Cavalry and artillery combined made an attack on a position today. The artillery shelled the position while the cavalry galloped up and took up a position on the flank. All the available cavalry in camp were massed together at a certain point, and when the order was given they galloped up in a column of troops, and swung into line opening a heavy rifle fire on the same object as the artillery.

The 12th Manitoba Dragoons as the senior regiment led the cavalry, and took a position on the right of the line. The precision with which the movement was executed shows great thoroughness in the training of the troops. From the high ground to the north, a magnificent view of the operations was obtained, and the sight of thousands of galloping chargers was indeed a magnificent one. A large number of spectators assembled from Winnipeg, thoroughly enjoyed the spectacle.

EDUCATION COST IN LONDON PASSES PREVIOUS YEARS

London, July 2.—At a recent meeting the London county council considered the education estimates for the current financial year.

Expenditure on capital amount is estimated to amount to at least £1,000,000 which is considerably in excess of the expenditure in previous years. This amount, in the opinion of the finance committee may be regarded as exceptional, the estimated expenditure being increased by expenditure in connection with the board of education scheme for reducing the size of classes.

The total estimated gross cost of education for the year is £6,286,320, of which £1,475,480 is provided by government grants and £4,810,840 is raised by

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a rate of 2s. 11d. in the pound. Grants from the board of education for certain schools and institutions and students provide £38,285 duties and malt liquor and spirits £176,903; sundry receipts £93,077, and relief from balances £137,827.

In introducing the estimates, which were approved finally in detail, J. W. Gilbert said that the amount of this year's estimate constituted a new record. They were at the highest point both in regard to capital and maintenance expenditure and the education rate was the highest yet levied by the education authority of London.

Toward the gross cost of education in London the government contribution had decreased from 32.4 per cent in 1903-4 to 26 per cent, but the county councils of England generally received from the government for the purposes of education, an amount much larger than that provided by the rates. If London were to receive 50 per cent of the cost the government would have to provide an additional million in grants. Whereas London only received grants amounting to 28.6 per cent of the total cost of education, the contribution received by Manchester amounted to 42.4 per cent.
