Mr. Cody's Plan for Uasing Bombs Two Thousand Feet Up

Mr. Cody, London, has revealed highly ingenious plan for fighting dirigibles of the Zeppelin type. He says: "I call my method fishing for the enemy,' and that is really what it s like. My device is based on the knowledge that aeroplanes can fly aster and higher than any Zeppelin, and the process has been already tested and found practicable and efficient. My plan is to fly up until my machine is one or two thousand to fish for them with a long, thin steel hawser, at the end of which I propose That bomb will be of a very high power and easily exploded. In fact, the least touch will fire it, and it will shoot flames in six directions at once to a distance of eight feet each. If my first 'drag' misses its mark, all I have to do is to wheel round and try again. Following after the spurts of flame there will issue from my bombs pieces of lighted tow or other material soaked in some highly in flammable spirit, which will inevitably fire any portion of the structure of the dirigible that may have escaped the first effects of the explosion. The vessel would be absolutely at the mercy of the man in the aeroplane sailing a thousand feet above it.
