by Nursing Sister Pauline Balloch.
The ceremony was brought to a fitting

James Monteith following which the
boys marched back to their quarters
and were disbanded. On Sunday
next a similar service will be held by
the Hartland Veterans in which all
the boys from here who can possibly
attend will gladly participate.
