

Quebec are distributed by the head of the department to charitable institutions. At one time 500 birds were confiscated and distributed a few days before Christmas.

PROTECTIVE MEASURES.
Dr. Finnie, of Montreal, read an interesting letter on Forest Protection and its bearings on fish and game preservation.

The subject, he said, was one which should appeal not only to sportsmen, the settler, but to every well-wisher of the country. If there was one duty more important than another in the present condition of the game preserves it was to see that they are so protected, not alone from the hand of the game bag but also to guard against the wanton destruction of forest lands. Much of the change was caused by the lack of proper precautions. The thoughtless smoker cast away his still burning cigar butt, the rakings of a pipe, or a match. There was no denying the fact that the individuals with guns who went into the woods to shoot were rapidly increasing in number. Something should be done to instruct them. The protection of the forests was becoming a live question. Without adequate protection to the woods, the game would rapidly disappear, so also would the fish from the inland waters. By all means let the association press upon the government the importance of protection. Hunters should be careful of fire. Fire has done more damage to forests, ten times over than the woodman's axe. Nature had been most lavish in her gift and it was the duty of the association to see the forests were safe guarded. In Nova Scotia 300,000 acres was burned over and the direct loss entailed \$2,000,000. In New Brunswick the estimated loss by fire was \$80,000,000 feet of timber. In Ontario more than 150 fires occurred in 1903, but not of an extensive character. The province paid in 1903 \$31,000 for fire protection. In Quebec in the same year 200 square miles of territory were devastated by fire, and \$17,000 was spent in forest protection. Dr. Finnie said in conclusion: "To those who are engaged in this good work let us give them

all the encouragement possible. The full results cannot be actually seen by those who are carrying it out, but they certainly can be inferred, and in a great deal to the country at large—not alone perpetuating a valuable asset but preserving to us the present climatic conditions, our water ways, and supplying a constant source of pleasure to the love of nature. By all means give them the good word."

AGAINST SLAUGHTER OF GAME.

The next paper read was called How best to open public opinion as to the need of fish and game protective laws. It was prepared by Geo. Armstrong of Montreal and this absence was read by Secretary Chambers.

The realization had come home very strongly to the writer as to the duty resting on all good sportsmen and patriots to educate public opinion upon the policy which the association advocated. They should be educated by letters to the local papers, supplemented by talks in school houses and other centres in the district where poaching and indiscriminate slaughter of fish and game was most generally practised. There might be some argument against preserves but fish and game protection was not injurious to the poor man. He should have it pointed out to him that when a neighbor brought home a wagon load of fish, deer, or six or seven moose, such a man was taking not merely his own share but also the shares of several of his neighbors. He trusted to see branches of the association formed at as many centres as possible. The Foresters, the Elks, the Woodmen, and Redmen might render assistance in the crusade. The writer trusted the paper would be followed by a debate and that one result would be a concentrated effort to get at the voter and secure his support.

Hon. H. G. Thomas, of Stowe, (Vt.), read a voluminous paper relating to seining in Lake Champlain, and also a correspondence in connection with the same subject. There were laws, he said, prohibiting seining in the waters of Lake Champlain and all others in Vermont. The governors appointed a commission to present the matter to the dominion government. A short session was held in Montreal in December, 1904, and arrangements were made and a joint session held in Quebec Jan. 12, Mr. Thomas was not at those sessions.

He read to the association the proceedings of the morning session of the commission, when Mr. Meigs, member from Mississippi, said that in 1896 19,999 pickerel, 6,000 white fish and 76,600 coarse fish were taken. Mr. Meigs further said the catching out of the coarse fish did more toward the fishing interests than any thing else.

Mr. Thomas then went into an extended report of what he pertaining to the seining and fishing on the Lake Champlain waters in Vermont and the dominion. The reason he cited the few statements made by Mr. Meigs, was to call attention to the political subterfuges used by the fishermen and their representatives to counteract any influence New York and Vermont

might have before the minister of marine and fisheries.

Mr. Thomas further spoke of the Dominion government, residing by an order in council, seining in Mississippi Bay, a part of Lake Champlain in Canada. This it was understood by the meeting was brought about through the attitude of Mr. Meigs, whose constituency was in Mississippi district, and whose residents objected to the removal of letting or seining privileges.

The matter will be further discussed today. The committee on nomination and election was formed as follows: Hon. A. T. Dugas, D. G. Smith, D. Funnie, H. R. Chamberlain, E. G. F. of Vermont, G. H. Reynolds, P. E. Island.


