This was contemptible enough, but when Gotha published his Sarous of Westier every idiotic scribbler in Germany in his attempts to imitate the honored author sank in still more unfathomable depths of idiocy. In the latter part of the sixteenth century there were fops in London who in their efforts to imitate the prince of fops out-Brommell Brommell himself, yet by so doing they gained nothing but contempt in their own day, and oblivion in the days that have followed. When Childe Harold made his author famous a thousand long haired rhymer stars at once became minuet, and as if that were not enough, they adopted the broad turn down collar of the author and some of them went so far as to imitate his limp. Albert County Councilors.

The election for Councilors came off last Tuesday with the following result: Hillsboro: Henry B. Steeves 102; Peter Duffy 99; Harvey J. Sorrens 83; John T. Steeves 57. Harvey: Wm. A. West 88; C. G. Smith 87; W. E. Starr 76. Other persons in nomination retired from the contest before polling day.

At Hillsboro: For 49; against 40. Harvey: For 21; against 104. Hillsboro: For 49; against 80. The vote on the Alma house and income questions was not taken in favour of said House, there being no contest for Councilors in those parishes. We have not yet learned the result of the vote in Elgin but doubtless both questions will have large negative majorities in the whole County.
