

TO PAY INCOME TAX | COULD NOT IN CUSTOMS HOUSES

The fatal date of April 30, by which time all first payments of 1924 income tax must be made, is drawing nearer.

This year a new regulation has gone into force and payments may be made to the collectors of customs who are located at 11 different centres throughout the province campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle, Chatham, Moncton Sackville, Saint John, St Stepher, St. Andrews, Fredericton and Woodstock.

In the port of Saint John, in view of the fact that the income tax inspector's office is located in the city, payments are made at that office and not with the collector of customs.

It is permitted by the Minister of the Department that persons in the districts outside the port of Saint John who express a preference to continue the old practice of filing their tax returns directly at the inspector's office in Saint John may do so.
