Pilots to the Rescue.

The schooner Maggie H., Captain Hartley, of Trinity, fished at Renew's the past summer and did fairly well. She left there Thursday for home and went as far as Baccalieu when she met a head wind yesterday morning and the skipper decided to run back for St. John's. As she entered the Narrows at 3.30 p.m. yesterday, when in the baffling wind which prevailed the strap of the main sheet block gave out the boom swung over, and the vessel going into shoal water struck once but did not suffer much damage. Both anchors were dropped first and a kedge was put out later to get the vessel off. Then the pilot boat put in appearance and going to the vessel's aid took her into deep water and towed her to port. The kedge anchor was slipped and buoyed and was secured to-day. The pilot boat this season has been the means of affording timely aid to vessels meeting with mishaps similar to this. If a good steam engine were installed in the boat, giving her more power, she would be able to do better work.

Denver, Col., September 17.—Her bridal costume reaching barely to her knees, Jennie Trammel, twelve years old, and diminutive, was married to James M. Taylor, twenty-five years, her senior. Through this marriage Taylor becomes the husband of his brother's step-daughter, and the brother-in-law of his wife's mother, as well as the husband of his own niece by marriage.

The ceremony was performed by Magistrate Morris, in the presence of the girl's mother and her step-father, who gave their consent. The bridegroom is more than six feet tall.

Beyond the Court's Jurisdiction.

Mr. Plowden succumbed to a dilemma which confronted him as Marylebone in dealing with the case of a married woman, Elizabeth Booth, aged 50, of Great Barlow Street, Marylebone, who was charged with being incapable drunk in the street. Assistant Jailer Summers informed his worship that the woman was deaf and could not read.

How do you communicate with her? I cannot. I may try five or six times to make her understand what I say to her and she only guesses at what I mean.

Then you don't get much pleasure out of her society? No, I don't. (A laugh.)

"Well, I shall have to discharge her," Mr. Ployden said. "But you must do something to influence and control her. Warn the publicans in the neighbourhood not to serve her. Yesterday the sheriff arrested Smith and took him before a justice of the peace, where the maximum fine, under the local option law, \$900, or \$300 on each count, was assessed. New York on the Eve of Police Graft Exposure.

New York, September 17.—New York city is on the eve of another "police graft" exposure if credence is to be given the persistent reports in circulation in police circles to-day. These are to the effect that a police official who had been caught in the coils of the stringent investigation into vice conditions instigated by acting-Mayor Mitchell, had indicated his desire to tell the high administrative authorities all that he knew concerning the collection of graft from gamblers, proprietors of disorderly resorts and other panders to the vices of the community. Revelation of shocking conditions at Coney Island, made as the result of the initial crusade on the acting-Mayor's orders, was simply a starting point for the disclosures likely to follow, it was said, in connection with the report that a sensation was about to be sprung. Twenty-five persons have been indicted by the King's county grand jury as a result of the early disclosures, since Inspector O'Brien was relieved from duty there. It is now declared that the Manhattan grand jury will now also begin the taking of testimony as a result of Acting-Mayor Mitchell's later charges that the Tenderloin is again the scene of open gambling and that disorderly resorts are being run with the connivance of the police.

Reports to-day were that the police official who had determined to confess had no expectation of retaining his place in the department, but had determined upon his course with the view of "standing from under" sufficiently to avoid criminal prosecution.

Killed His Wife By Mistake.

Norristown, Pa., September 17.—Mrs. John G. Hallman, of Limerick township, was shot and killed in her home by her husband. According to a statement made by Hallman to Coroner King, he had been annoyed by hawks stealing chickens.

He heard a commotion in the poultry yard, and thinking that a hawk was at work grabbed his shotgun and hastened across the room.

He tripped over a piece of carpet, was thrown forward, and the gun struck the jam of the door. The shell was discharged and the load of birdshot tore a hole in Mrs. Hallman's back, killing her instantly. Mrs. Hallman was looking out of the window trying to see the hawk.

Mr. Hallman is 61 years old and his wife was 57. They were married last April.
