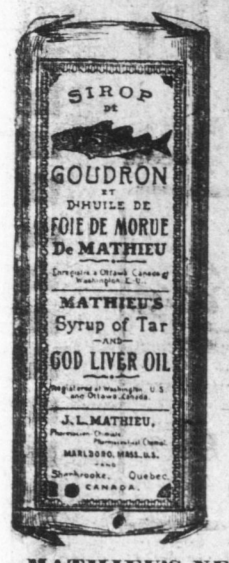

The Evening Chit-Chat

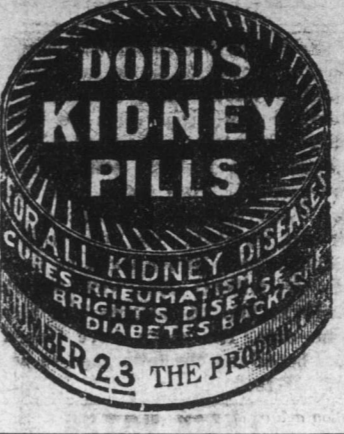

According to the United States latest census there are 4,832,630 women in the country who work for wages. That is, one out of every five women is obliged to be a wage earner.

Don't those statistics impress upon you the big necessity for women to get out of the still comparatively few beaten paths in which they have been most successful, in order not to lower wages to starvation point by overcrowding these few occupations?

Don't those statistics impress upon you your duty to help our wage-earning sisters by sending in to this column any hints as to unusual occupations at which women you know or have heard of have made their living or even home pin money? I hope they do. Here are a few suggestions that have come to me: I have heard that the law publishing houses pay very good salaries to women to analyze, designate and classify decisions of the Federal and State courts. I should think such an occupation might be more profitable and more congenial to many women than school teaching or ordinary clerical work.

and should be absolutely free from lumps. A little alcohol rubbed on quickly will clean a dirty window better than soap; ammonia in wash water is equally good.

Chiffon velvet is a most excellent thing for brushing a felt hat, whether a man's or a woman's. Physicians claim that sleep is more refreshing in a darkened room. It is well to accustom children from infancy to sleep in the dark.

Dampness will soon tarnish brass articles. But if they are kept in a dry and cool place they will remain untarnished for a long time.

A flannel dipped in spirits of turpentine will be found very useful in cleaning the porcelain tub or sink. Kerosene will answer almost as well.

Wet shoes should be stuffed with paper before they are put away. The paper will absorb the moisture and keep the shoes from becoming hard.

When packing the tin bottle corks well and put the bottles in the middle of the trunk. If packed solidly in this way they will carry around the world.

Brass polished only with rottenstone and oil will have a deep, rich yellow tone, while the acid polishes leave it whiter and more brilliant.

Cold water with but little soap should be used for washing colored silks. If the color runs, vinegar should be stirred into the water until the color sets.

When coal is needed on the fire in the sick room it should be brought in the room in paper bags, which should be laid gently on the fire to prevent noise.

A teaspoonful of glycerine added to a gill of glue makes a cement that is of great convenience in the kitchen, and is especially good for fastening sather, paper or wood to metal.

A dry rubber "sponge" is excellent for cleaning woolen materials. They should be laid flat and the sponge swept over them briskly, care being taken to rub the wrong side of the nap.

Dampers should be placed in all pipes leading from heaters and kept closed in summer, as air from the furnace should not be allowed to flow into the house when the fire is out.

An Electric Eye. Professor Rosing of the Institute of Technology, St. Petersburg, is announced to give a public lecture of a discovery which he claims to be one of the most remarkable ever made by a scientist. He declares that after fifteen years of constant labour he has succeeded in constructing an electro-telescope apparatus which has all the virtues of what might be termed an "electric eye," and which will enable the fortunate owner to see anything and anyone he chooses. By an adjustment of the apparatus an employer sitting in his office will be able to will to "see" other parts of the building and watch his unconscious employees at work. A man will be able to sit at home and witness in beautiful performance or arrivals at a railway station, or any event of interest that may be happening a long distance away from the observer.

Professor Rosing claims that a general who uses his invention will be able to observe the movements of the enemy as well as the movements of his own forces. He promises to give a full explanation of his invention in the near future.

Household Notes.

Never polish a piano with anything but refined linseed oil. Verdigris can be removed from brass by the use of ammonia. A mixture of borax and red pepper is good to rid closets of insects.

Nothing makes a finer polish for tinware than good wood ashes. Medicine should never be left in sight of the invalid in the sick room. Jonquils or daffodils are placed to advantage in a brass or copper urn or vase.

Undue consumption of tea, coffee, cocoa and chocolate will make the skin sallow. To make sure that bread will rise in cold weather, warm the flour before mixing. Shoes will last much longer if occasionally rubbed with vaseline when they are new.

A small quantity of chopped figs added to a nut and apple salad gives an excellent flavor. A long-handled buttonhook should be kept in the laundry to clean the lint from the tub outlets.

The cheaper and lighter the pan the whiter and lighter your bread when you bake in a gas range. For obstinate nose bleed put an ice pack or a cloth wrung out in ice water at the back of the neck. Baked rice or baked potato will go excellently with sweetbreads, and this dish is good for the sick.

A cloth shirt should never be hung up inside out, as this tends to crease it, more than anything else. To insure that potted plants will thrive, always have a little water in the saucer under the flower-pot. When milk boils over on the stove sprinkle on some salt at once. This will counteract the disagreeable odor. Bronzes should be cleaned by rubbing with sweet oil. Rub dry with soft cloth and polish with chamois.

After putting buttered paper in the cake pans, sprinkle in just a little flour. This will keep the cakes from sticking. Gruel, when properly prepared, should be a little thicker than cream.

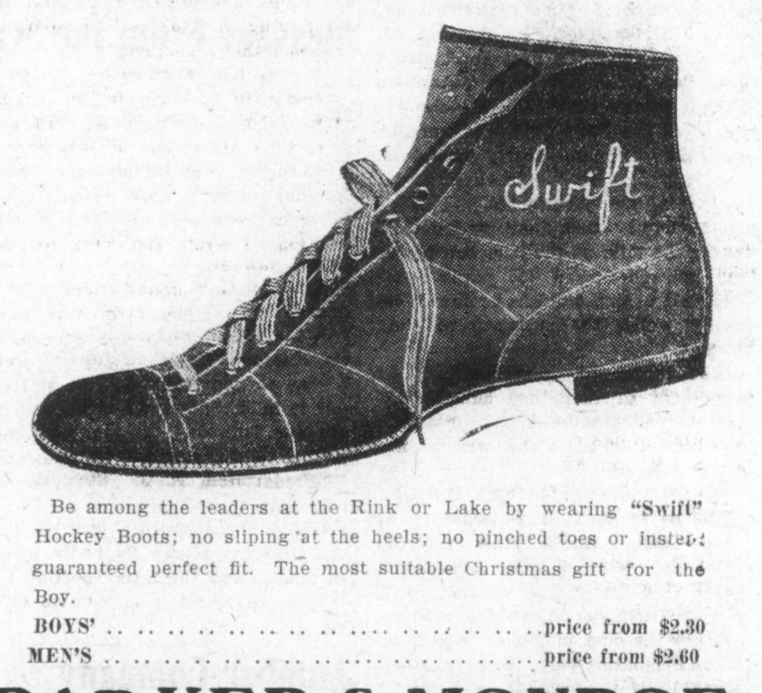
