### Food Speculation a Crime in France.

French Government Introduces Bill  
Providing Drastic Punishment.

Paris, Nov. 14.—Following upon the  
bill for the establishment of municipal  
bake-houses and butchers' shops, de-  
signed to prevent illegitimate increase  
in the cost of necessities, the French  
Government has introduced a measure  
for combating "corners" in provisions  
of any kind of merchandise.

The proposed legislation would pun-  
ish with imprisonment, ranging from  
two months to two years, and with a  
fine ranging from 1,000 francs (\$200)  
to 20,000 francs (\$4,000), any individ-  
ual or association of individuals, who,  
even without employing fraudulent  
methods but with the intention of il-  
licit speculation, shall have brought  
about a rise or fall of prices in pro-  
visions or merchandise above or be-  
low the price which would have been  
determined by the natural and free  
competition of commerce.

### Bonar Law And Home Rule

Special Evening Telegram,  
LONDON, To-Day.

At the opening at Bootle, Lancas-  
hire, last night of the Unionist cam-  
paign against Home Rule, the Opposi-  
tion leader, Bonar Law, said his  
party was determined to fight the pro-  
posal to the last gasp. Many people,  
he said, favoured Home Rule because  
they were tired of death of the Irish  
problem and would be glad to see it  
out of the way. The duty of the Uni-  
onists was to convince them that it  
would bring to Ireland no peace but  
a sword. Ireland wanted less pol-  
itics and more industry. John Red-  
mond and his friends are promising  
to Ireland more politics and less in-  
dustry. They were wise in trying to  
get Home Rule, while they could,  
continued the speaker. This was their  
last chance. Every year the de-  
mand for it was diminishing. In Ire-  
land in another ten years the agita-  
tion will have died out. He declared  
it was utterly impossible to pass the  
bill this Parliament.

MADRID, Dec. 8.  
King Alfonso has received a letter  
from the Infanta Eulalia, asking him  
to pardon her, and saying that she  
had acted in a moment of forgetful-  
ness. She begs the opportunity of  
showing that she is an affectionate  
aunt and a true and loyal Spaniard.  
The dispute between Alfonso and his  
aunt was over her publication of a  
book relating to her experience of  
Court life, which the King forbade  
her to publish.

have had of reinstating the ex-Shah  
of Persia by informing the Cabinet  
at St. Petersburg that it will be im-  
possible for Britain to recognize him.

PEKIN, Dec. 8.  
An Imperial edict was issued to-  
day sanctioning the cutting off of  
Queens. A telegram from Wu Chang  
says that revolutionaries there are  
hopeful that the extension of armis-  
tice will result in peace. Traders are  
willing to concede full powers to  
Premier Yuan Shi Kai provided that  
he agrees to the entire elimination of  
the Manchus from the Central Gov-  
ernment.

LONDON, Dec. 8.  
The reported prospective purchase  
of the Nelson Company of Argentina's  
Meat Plant by the Armour Company  
for \$2,500,000, generally credited here,  
has filled English statesmen with ap-  
prehension. They foresee the com-

trans-Atlantic importing trade in Am-  
erican interests to the detriment of  
Canada and India alike.
