## A Sad Case.

A boy named James Cleary, suffering from acute peritonitis, was removed from his home on Battery Road in the ambulance to hospital yesterday afternoon and his recovery is doubtful. The circumstances surrounding the case are particularly sad. Last year he was in the General Hospital and was transferred from there to the Fever Hospital, having contracted scarlet fever. Only a short time ago he was released from there and has since developed his present disease. The boy's father is totally blind, and his brother was drowned in Long Pond a few years ago.

## Got 12 Months for Larceny.

Herbert Cooper, a laborer, of Tilt Cove, who was convicted for the larceny committed at Bell Island and other places, came up for sentence before Judge Knight yesterday afternoon. For each of the nine charges the accused got one month, and for the tenth offence received three months, totalling a year's imprisonment. During the trial Inspector General Sullivan made an earnest plea on the prisoner's behalf, intimating to the court that he was an orphan, his father having been killed in the mines at Tilt Cove some time ago.

## Shell Sinks Steamer.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-Day.  
A telegram from a shipping agency at Smyrna to-day says the Archipelago-American Steamship Co's steamer Texas, which went down in the Gulf of Smyrna with 140 persons on Monday night, was sunk by a shell fired from a military fort and not by a mine, as at first reported. The dispatch says two blank shots were fired first by the Turkish fortifications, warning the vessel she had strayed from her proper channel, but when she took no notice a shell sent her to the bottom. This version of the steamer's loss is regarded as quite probable, for the authorities have repeatedly warned shipping companies of the risks their vessels would run of being fired on by the fort if they strayed from the channel marked out for them when entering or leaving the harbor. The blowing up of the steamer Texas brought the Dardanelles into greater prominence but has not caused a rise in the rates of insurance to the Black Sea, as it was regarded as an isolated case due to a mine breaking loose. Both the Italian and the Turkish Ambassadors had interviews with Sir Edward Grey at the Foreign Office. It is understood that the Turkish Ambassador stated that an additional reason for keeping the Dardanelles closed was that the Italians had cut the telegraph line and no information could be obtained as to the whereabouts of the Italian fleet. Sir Edward also received a deputation from the Chamber of Shipping, protesting against serious injury to British interests, which the closing of the Dardanelles involved. The Secretary replied, explaining it would be difficult for Britain to bring pressure on other Powers in connection with their conduct of warlike operations, but he would telegraph to Rome and endeavour to secure at least a temporary reopening of the Dardanelles for commerce. It is announced from Constantinople that the Council of Ministers will reconsider the question to-day.

## Cable News.

LONDON, May 1.  
The debate on the Home Rule Bill was resumed in the Commons this afternoon. Sir Robert Finlay, Unionist, characterized the Bill as the worst of three Home Rule measures. He ridiculed the idea that its sponsors should succeed where Gladstone had twice failed. In the case of Ulster, he maintained that the province was ten times stronger than the American colonies in the eighteenth century, and said if the Government forced the Bill it would mean civil war. Criticizing the financial provisions of the measure, Sir Robert found cardinal objections in the proposal to set up customs barriers between England and Ireland, and characterized it as a most retrograde and disastrous step.

LONDON, May 1.  
The rush demand for life rafts and life boats had a remarkable sequel at Liverpool, which resulted in a stoppage of work, and a revival of the long-standing dispute between ship carpenters and shop carpenters. The former contended that the latter had no right to work at boat making. The flood of work which followed the Titanic disaster naturally led all employers to engage every available hand. The result was that the ship carpenters laid down their tools and refused to work with the others. If the trouble is not settled quickly it will further complicate the difficulties of ship owners.

Counsel for Mrs. Robins, widow of the valet of John Jacob Astor, who is suing for damages for the death of her husband aboard the Titanic, announced this afternoon that Bruce Ismay and other witnesses had been excused for the present and were at liberty to sail for England if they cared to do so.

Five men were burned to death and damage estimated at \$450,000 done to boats and gasoline on the docks to-day when a Standard oil barge exploded.

Messrs. Job Bros. propose purchasing the iron barge Earlsbush, which is now in Liverpool, and negotiations are now going on. If secured she will be engaged in running in the South American fish trade along with the Job new auxiliary vessel Netherthorn which is due her the end of the present month. Capt. Charles McConney, who will command the Earlsbush, left by the Almeriana a few days ago to complete the arrangements. The new barge is a little larger than the Charlotte Young which was lost near the Azores two years ago. The Earlsbush is over thirty years old, being built at Dundee in 1876, but since then was rebuilt and recased and should prove a fine fish carrier.
