## Soldier Died in Needless Terror.

West Chester, Aug. 13.—Colonel Gibbons Gray Cornwell, commander of the Sixth regiment, National Guard of Pennsylvania, who committed suicide on a Pennsylvania Railroad train returning here to face, as he thought, charges of embezzling nearly \$300,000, was not to have been prosecuted. His family, friends and officers and men in his regiment had arranged to meet the entire deficit brought about through the speculations of Colonel Cornwell from the trust funds over which he had control.

All of this came out through F. P. Eberman, a brother-in-law. Mr. Eberman had prepared to throw his entire fortune in the financial hole, which grows larger as the investigations of the shortage progresses. The men of the regiment were standing solidly behind the Colonel and had prepared to help. "There was no need for Colonel Cornwell taking his life," said Mr. Eberman. "The shortage would have been met."

## WIDOW TO GIVE UP INSURANCE.

It was learned to-day that Colonel Cornwell carried \$50,000 in life insurance in three companies. Mrs. Cornwell is named as the beneficiary in all the policies, but she has announced that she will give up every cent to reimburse the persons who have lost money through her husband's speculations.

All of these policies were taken out before 1903. Friends of Colonel Cornwell said they believed he was demoralized for some time. Colonel Colgate, a National Guardsman and a close friend, told of how Cornwell had wired him some weeks ago for an immediate loan of \$30,000. This loan was to be made without security, and simply on the strength of friendship.

## LOST TRUST FUNDS IN STOCKS.

Experts working upon the accounts of Colonel Cornwell find that some of the trust funds left in the care of the Colonel have disappeared entirely, while of others very little are left. The speculations have covered a period of eight years. Figures now obtainable would indicate a shortage of \$277,000 every dollar of which apparently was lost in the stock market.

Bonds belonging to the estates in the care of Colonel Cornwell have been traced to two brokerage houses where they are held as collateral. If the stock upon which these bonds were given as collateral should rise the losses would be reduced considerably, provided the brokers can be persuaded to close out the accounts and turn over the money to the executors of Col. Cornwell's estate.
