Notes and Comments.

We observe that Dr. Curtis expresses high appreciation of the devoted labours of teachers, but he also points out the onerous conditions under which they work. These conditions will continue until the time arrives when schools can be more fully staffed. It is impossible that pupils can receive the training which is due to them, so long as one or two teachers are called upon to conduct schools with classes varying from the Kindergarten to the Associate Grade of the Council of Higher Education.

Of these teachers Dr. Curtis reports:—
"Many of these (schools) impose upon the teacher a very heavy burden to train one, two, or three classes for the C. H. E. Examinations, and, in addition, conduct classes in all the standards down to the Primer. For such teachers the school day is all too short. But many of these teachers are in the time of golden youth when hope is buoyant, ambition overmastering, weariness but little known, and above all, enthusiasm boiling over, and so they work on uncomplainingly. At the same time the sooner such conditions can be remedied the better. The ideal is never attained until teachers are placed in a position to render the highest service of which they are capable to all their pupils, without endangering their own health or mortgaging their future usefulness."

The abolition of the C. H. E. examinations would afford no adequate relief to the situation. It would not meet the main difficulties of the situation which is due to the lack of a sufficient number of teachers and the inadequacy of professional training of the majority of those who are given charge of schools.

To-Day's News.

LONDON, To-day.—Pending the conclusion of a formal armistice covering the operations of all allies, the Montenegrins are renewing their dispute, and efforts to capture Scutari, the fall of which, according to an official report issued at Cetinje, is imminent. There is no confirmation of the story from Trieste that owing to exhaustion of food, the Commander of Scutari is endeavouring to negotiate for its surrender, but the Belgrade despatch says the Montenegrins have all Serbia's heavy artillery before Scutari and are employing it in their attack, though Serbian troops, either have left or are leaving that district. It is stated Montenegrins are endeavouring to arrange with Serbia for the purchase of this artillery. It is supposed the Montenegrin Government have closed the frontier and suspended poets, and telegrams in order to prevent interference by the Great Powers until Scutari falls. The report published at Bucharest says, under the settlement it was arranged at Petersburg, Roumania will receive Silistria with about two miles of territory around the town, and right to erect fortifications.

LONDON, To-day.—Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting towards war over the possession of Saloniki. According to the Chronicle's correspondent, the Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated an army in the neighborhood of Saloniki, while another is being landed at Orfali in order to watch the movements of the Bulgarians at Drama and Kavala. The victorious Epirus army from Janina is being distributed along the new strategic front from Saloniki to Orfali. Meanwhile, adds the correspondent, the Bulgarians have suspended the passenger traffic between Dedeagatch and Saloniki, utilizing the railway for the concentration of troops in the neighborhood of Drama, close to the Greek position. They have already brought one division each from Adrianople, Tchaatja and Bulair. It is estimated that the Bulgarians now have 90,000 soldiers facing the Greeks and Serbian forces supporting the Greek, which are assembling along the railway north of Saloniki and on the right bank of the Vardar River.

BRUSSELS, To-day.—Owing in great part to the advice of the King, the Government to-day accepted a compromise, proposed by the Liberal leader, and the great strike for manhood suffrage is called off till Thursday.

LONDON, To-day.—The Shrewsbury bye-election resulted in a victory for the Unionist candidate: Lloyd, Unionist, 2,412; Morris (Ind.), 1,727.

BERLIN, To-day.—The Budget Committee of the Reichstag voted yesterday to appoint a parliamentary committee of enquiry into the armaments scandal.

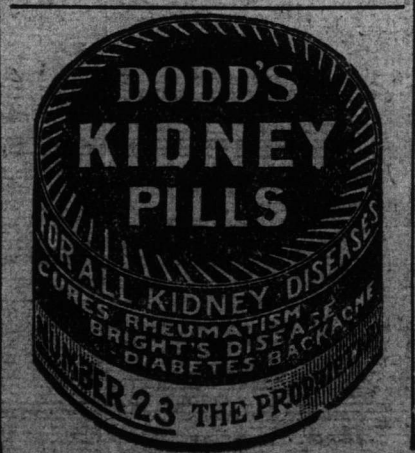
