The Terra Nova's, who are substituting the Crescents, will have strong material in their ranks, whilst the Peildians, St. Bon's and Victorias will also be well represented.

Germany Dangling Tunis as Bait to Make Italy Fight

Rome, Dec. 2.—The German Government has apparently not yet despaired of seeing Italy rise to a well-baited hook, but the Italian papers say it will take more to draw Italy back to the German net than the latest snare spread for her.

Those remarks refer to an article in the Deutsche Tageszeitung, inviting Italy to step in and take over Tunis, now that she has the chance.

The paper points out that, reinforced by the Turkish fleet and the Austrian navy, the Italian fleet would easily be a match for the Anglo-French squadrons in the Mediterranean.

A little reflection, concludes the pamphlet, should suffice to convince Italy that all she needs is a decision to do and dare. The result would be as easy to obtain as it would be profitable and far-reaching.

Quoting this article, Italian papers declare that there is good authority for asserting that it undoubtedly reflects the ideas of the Wilhelmstrasse, and was, indeed, directly inspired by the German Foreign Office.

At the City Hall.

The regular weekly meeting of the Civic Commission was held last night, those present being the Chairman, Mr. W. G. Gosling, Messrs. Ayre, Bradshaw, McNamara, Jackson, Mullaly, Morris and Anderson.

P. Templeman submitted a counter claim for damages caused by water overflow, against the taxes imposed by the Council. The Board is of the opinion that Mr. Templeman has no claim.

The question as to the disposal of the Ryan's property for the improvement of Queen Street again came up for discussion. The matter was deferred pending the arrival of Mr. F. Trelogan from Boston.

F. W. Angel, Engineer for the Furness Withy Co., asked permission to change a place of entrance to the Company's premises on the waterfront in the East End. The Company must bear all the expenses and the work must be done in conformity with any conditions that may be laid down by the Engineer.

Mr. Ryan, an employee of the Council as carter, wrote asking why he had been paid off. He will be informed that he is to receive a share of any casual work that may arise, but there is nothing to warrant his being kept on the permanent pay roll.

The Solicitor reported that in his opinion the claim of Benjamin Squires for damages caused by diverting a waterway near his property cannot be entertained. Mr. Squires will be so informed.

H. Blatch, Long's Hill, wrote complaining of the condition of the drain on the south side of Carter's Hill. Referred to the Supervisor.

The Reid Nrd. Co. wrote that their hydrants on the Dock premises were only used by the Council employees, and if the Council intended removal or alterations they should stand the necessary expenses.

Mr. Mullaly called the attention of the Council to an old shed near the Court House, and suggested its immediate removal. It was decided that the Public Health Officer and Inspector General be written in the matter.

Mr. McNamara suggested that the junction of Mullock Street and Barnes Road be attended to. The matter was referred to the Engineer.

A claim from one of the Engineer's staff for extra work done during the visit of the water expert, was referred to the Office Committee.

The Engineer's report was submitted, showing that the repairs to Prescott Street had cost over \$2,000. With the passing of pay rolls, and granting requirements the meeting adjourned at 10.10 p.m.

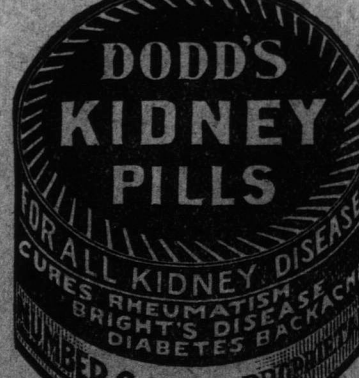
Better 16 5-in. Guns Built for Britain.

London, Nov. 27.—A strange report is being heard here as to how Messrs. Krupp came to build the famous 42 centimetre guns that played such havoc with the French and Belgian fortifications.

Two and a half years ago, it is said, an American firm finished the plans for the construction of these guns. The designs were sent here to a big firm of patent agents, to be patented. This firm had in its employ a clever young German draughtsman, who resigned his place and returned to Germany shortly after the American plans and specifications had been lodged with his firm.

When the German army turned out its 32-centimetre guns, his disappearance was understood by those interested.

However, it is said now that the same American firm has improved and perfected its former designs, and that several of these improved guns now are under construction here for the British siege trains. It is said that the newest United States battle-ships are to have guns of the same calibre.

Work in Forest Lands.

At a meeting of the British Columbia Forest Club, held at the University Club on Friday evening, Mr. R. D. Cameron, District Inspector of Forest Reserves of the Dominion Railway Belt for British Columbia, gave a paper outlining the work that the Dominion Forest Branch had undertaken and accomplished during the past season on forest lands of the railway belt. Though the season had been one of the worst in the history of the Dominion Forest Branch, the situation had been splendidly met by its field officers. Many figures were given showing the extent of permanent improvements which were being carried on on the forest reserves. These reserves embrace practically all the absolute forest land which is reserved for the protection of timber. The meeting was made the occasion of a presentation of an amount of gold in a soldier's belt to Mr. J. B. Mitchell, who has been the assistant for some time past of Mr. G. D. McKay, timber inspector. Mr. Mitchell is a Newfoundland, who was a Rhodes' scholar to Oxford and who spent a year studying forestry in the forests of Germany and also spent considerable time in Belgium and France. He came to British Columbia some two years ago and has been with the Provincial Forest Branch since that time doing exploration work in the northern parts of British Columbia. For the past year he has been on the lower coast connected with the timber administration.—News-Advertiser, Vancouver, B.C., Dec. 2.

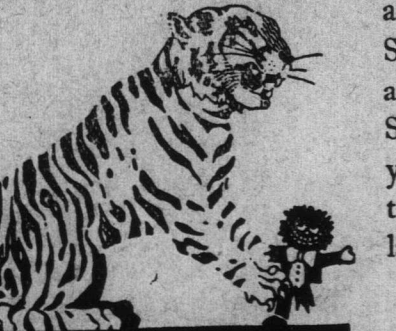

Thus far 611 is the total number that have come forward to enlist. Only half that number have gone through their medical examination.

That our brigade members and ex-members are responding nobly to the call to arms none can dispute. Out of the 611 volunteered to date, 418 have been identified with brigade work in the city and outposts, and 198 who have not had any experience. Our city brigades make up their quota as follows:—
