After Mr. Stoll, the organizing manager and General Director, had given some good advice concerning to-day's activities, Dr. W. W. Blackall delivered the most instructive address on local education heard for a long time. To give an idea of the strides education has made in Newfoundland, he submitted these figures: In 1891 there were in Newfoundland 124,784, or 65 p.c. of the population, who could not write. In 1901 the number had been cut down to 119,891, or 51 p.c. In 1911, the number was 72,808, or 31 p.c. In other words, the per centage, during those 20 years, improved by more than 100. The explanation is found

in these: There were 547 schools, with a teaching capacity of 32,339, in 1891. In 1914 there were 1,221—or 674 more—and the number of pupils was 53,012, or 20,673 more. And the explanation of this is found in the fact that the education grant in 1891 was \$150,000, and to-day it is \$550,000. In 1894 just 1,000 children entered for the C.H.E. exams; to-day there are 4,000 on the lists. Encouraging as these figures are, however, the present campaign will result in improvements that will change the entire aspect of education in this country. An interesting story of yesterday's campaign was told by Dr. Blackall. One of the solicitors called at Jensen Camp for the purpose of receiving a subscription from the matron. While there one of the patients came up to the collector and said, "Look here, I would like to give something to this thing. Put me down for \$50." Other patients came along, desiring to help, and the sum of \$175.00 was realized. Sir Edgar Bowring, in his brief remarks, told of a working man, with a family of 14, who had subscribed for \$50 a year, feeling that he wanted to be in on the thing, and in fact the cases resembling this are too numerous to mention. Everyone seemed delighted to give and all St. John's has proven most generous and free-hearted. To-day is the last day and by to-night \$250,000 must be the result. That was the objective set and that must be reached.

### Good Roads.

Motorists and others cannot help noticing and appreciating the effort being made by the East End Road Inspector to improve the condition of the roads in his district. Notwithstanding the enormous amount of heavy traffic from Bouch Cove, Flatrock, Torbay and St. John's the road is in a better condition than it has been for years. This is due to the better grading of the road bed, and a much better class of material being used. Another marked improvement is the building of a concrete bridge at the bottom of Piperstock Hill which was very badly needed. We understand it is intended to build a number of these bridges along the roads this year; if this is done it will be a very great improvement over the old style wooden bridge and will mean a great saving in the annual expenditure for repairs to bridges and will mean a larger amount being left for other repairs and improvements to the road.
