THE HABIT OF BLAME.

If the world fault, and any synonym it may possess (though I think none of them are so apt) might be ascribed out of the family vocabulary, much more family happiness there would be. And if the thought fault might go, too, we should surely be nearing the millennium.

What I mean by the thought fault is the mental habit of trying to pin everything that goes wrong in a household on some member of it.
