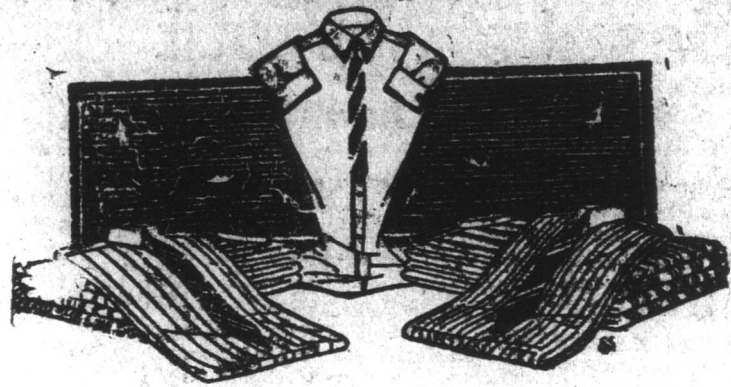

A Contemporary Opinion.

One of the city dailies is greatly exercised about Canada raising an objection against the guaranteeing by the British Government of part of the amount asked for by the promoters of, presumably, the Humber Proposition. The Canadian papers claim that similar projects in Canada should receive a like advance from the Home authorities—that it is unjust and unfair to bolster up Newfoundland's industrial propositions and withhold aid to Canadian propositions. We cannot see why there should be any objection raised by Canada. If the British tax-payer is satisfied, why should he not be permitted to do what he likes with his own money? Canada has indirectly received greater help than the one about which the objection is raised. We are inclined to believe that the cry raised by the local press about the unreasonable attitude of the Canadian people, is equally unreasonable. If the two millions that are said to be pledged to the Humber scheme are forthcoming, cannot Canada put forward her claim and seek to secure the help she needs? This question has no bearing upon the soundness or otherwise of the Humber Deal—that has to be worked out, and to the satisfaction of our people. It is now an open question, and stronger reasons than those already advanced will have to be put forward before the country will assume a liability of some ten million dollars.—Mr. Grace Standard.

**Fish Exporting
Country Imports Fish.**

Although Portugal exports canned and preserved fish—sardines, tunny, anchovies, etc.—by the shipload all over the world, her inhabitants have such a fondness for salt fish that they send fishing fleets way off to the banks of Newfoundland to catch the cod which does not approach Portuguese waters. Millions of pounds of dried codfish are brought into that country every year besides what are caught by the Portuguese boats at Newfoundland, says Consul General Hollis, Lisbon, in a report to the Department of Commerce, and it would be necessary to increase to 250 vessels the present 40 now engaged on the Newfoundland Banks before the demands of the people for salt cod would be satisfied. Fishing in Portugal's secondary industry, being next to agriculture.—N.Y. Fishing Gazette.

Murdered at**Husband's Grove.**

A shocking crime, and an instance of the inhuman practices still extant among the more ignorant sections of the Egyptian masses, has just been committed in the very centre of Cairo.

An old Egyptian from Upper Egypt who had been in domestic service in Cairo for a long period, died, and the same afternoon his funeral took place with the usual attendance of mourning relatives and friends. After the last rites had been concluded the menfolk left the cemetery, while the female mourners remained at the grave, chanting the usual dirges and conducting the awful wail's conventional on such occasions in Egypt. While the lamentations were proceeding, 2 men entered the cemetery, tore the widow of the deceased from the mound of new earth which covered his remains, took her to a corner of the cemetery, cut her throat and literally hacked her to pieces!

While this ghastly scene was being enacted the other women mourners stood within sight of it, the murderers

pleading justification. The widow, a young and pretty, they urged, a temptation to other men, and her former coolness towards her late husband convinced them that she was a great danger of straying from the paths of propriety. To prevent this they thought it best to kill her and destroy her body.

Always on The Job.**GIGANTIC ARMADA OF BRITISH SHIPS PROTECT STRAITS.**

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 23.—A formidable fighting force of fast, powerful and powerful bombing combat aircraft, together possessed greater destructive power than British at Scapa Flow, now guard the great international waterway the Near East from the Narrows of Marmora. The gigantic armada in these waters is led by the two dreadnoughts Revenge and Resolute. Then come the three veterans of naval prowess, the battleships Centurion, King George and Iron Duke. Some of these super-craft possess ponderous 16-inch guns having a range of twenty miles.

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
