A Neighboring Competitor.

The catch of the Lunenburg banking fleet for the past season is the largest ever recorded in the returns of Nova Scotia. The average catch per vessel also establishes a record. The total complement of fish weighed out of the holds of the Lunenburg banking schooners for the season 1922, amounts to three hundred and seventeen thousand and fifty quintals (dry). In catching this huge total one hundred vessels were employed, so that the average per vessel is three thousand, one hundred and seventy quintals. Though there was an increase in the fishing fleet of but five vessels over 1921, the total catch increase is over forty thousand quintals, a big showing indeed. The sums shared by the crews as wages are not given in the returns, but at an average price of six dollars per quintal, it is not difficult to figure out, allowing twenty men to be an average ship's company. The schooner owners of Lunenburg are more than satisfied with the season's results, and though markets have not been satisfactory, so far, there is every reason they contend, to expect an improvement. And even though more than half the total catch of their vessels is yet on their hands unsold, and cannot produce any financial returns until marketed, there is no pessimism. Lunenburgs chief dry cod-fish trade is with the West Indies and South America, both exporting centres to which not so many years ago a great portion of Newfoundland's catch went. But we lost Brazil through the stupidity and ignorance of those so-called statesmen who endeavoured to drive cargoes down the throats of Brazilian purchasers at government made prices. We may in time revive our lost trade in that direction. But meanwhile we have a great competitor in Lunenburg, the merchants of which port are not unlikely to take advantage of a situation created by ourselves, and hold on to that which they have. It will be a difficult task to get in on an equality with them now. Lunenburg realises the importance of the dry fish industry, and does not intend to slacken up on operations. Even with about one hundred and sixty thousand quintals in store, preparations are again being made in readiness for the start of the banking fleet on the first trip of 1923. Of course Lunenburg's catch is but little over one-fifth of that of Newfoundland—Bank, Shore and Labrador—but even so one port alone can produce over three hundred thousand quintals in one season is no mean competitor of ours, and should the future show that the exporters there have assumed full control of southern markets into which for decades Newfoundland fish had priority, then we shall have to seek other outlets for the product of our chief industry. And where may these be found?

Post Office Expenditure.

Dear Sir:—You have on several occasions charged me with misrepresentation, in saying that the Post Office expenditure was "about two million dollars." On Monday last you said that it was really "a million two hundred thousand," and a few days before that you named a little over "a million three hundred thousand" as the amount.

If you look at the Year Book for 1922, the figures of which are official, the expenditure of Post and Telegraphs for the year 1920-21 is given at \$1,839,428.25. That is a statement of the actual expenditure, not of the estimate, which is always much under the truth. You will see that my figures were much nearer the mark than yours, and were accurate enough for an ordinary platform speech, in which one seeks to avoid wearying and confusing the listeners by too much detail in figures.

I may say, by the way, that the expenditure in 1920-21 on the service, the first full year of the present Government, was about \$350,000 above the expenditure on the same service in the previous year, and the largest in the history of the country.

CRUSADE AGAINST KU KLUX.
NEW YORK, Nov. 24.

Police Commissioner Enright has received orders by telegraph from Mayor Hylan at French Lick Springs, Indiana, directing him to drive members Ku Klux Klan out of New York before that organization gains a foothold. "Treat this group as you would Red and bomb throwers," said one part of the mayor's instructions.

FREE STATE EXECUTES CHILDREN.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24.
Erskine Childers, Chief Lieutenant to De Valera, was executed at seven o'clock this morning. He was placed on trial before a military tribunal in Dublin on November 17, on a charge that he had a pistol in his possession when arrested on November 10 by Free State forces. He was fifty-two years old.

NEW CALIPH INVESTED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24.
Abdul Medid Effendi, the new elected Caliph, was formally invested with power to-day in the Topkapou Palace.

TWO IMPORTANT MEASURES.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
Premier Bonar Law, to-day, introduced in the Commons a bill putting into effect constitution of the Irish Free State, and a Free State Constitutional Provision Bill, both measures receiving their first reading.

MISTAKEN SENTIMENT.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24.
Miss Annie MacSweeney, who fasted outside the gates of Mount Joy prison since last Friday, as a protest against the imprisonment of her sister Mary, was removed last night by friends to a private home. She was in a very weak condition, but refused food, only taking water. Mary MacSweeney, hunger striking within the prison, now refuses visits from doctors and nurses, being taken care of solely by her fellow prisoners.

LABOR AMENDMENT DEFEATED.

LONDON, Nov. 24.
The first division in the new House of Commons occurred this afternoon but was carried by a government majority of 100, and the three against the Laborite opposition.

EXPATRIATE CRIME.

YARMOUTH, Nov. 24.
Omar P. Roberts, the sixty-seven years old guide, was hanged in the County Jail here at twelve seventeen this morning for the murder of August 28 of his nineteen year old housekeeper, Flora Gray. He met death unflinchingly, and was dead six seconds after the trap was sprung.

ANOTHER MURDERER HANGED.

HARRY DEAN was hanged here at five six this morning for the murder of Peter E. Goran, his landlady. He died in eleven seconds.

Italy's Revolution.

The circumstances by which the Fascists have acquired the reins of government in Italy are not without novelty. Irritated at the arrogance and violence of the Communists, the leaders of the moment decided to fight the proletariat, not only at the polls but also with their own weapons. Accordingly they resolved to take possession of as many towns as possible, and threatened to march on Rome. They mobilized all their armed men, and—though they have only 35 members in the Lower House—insisted on the demission of the sort of Coalition Government that was in office. The Government might have fought, but the King refused to allow Premier Facta to attack the Fascists, and when no party leader could be found to form a Government, invited Signor Mussolini, the Fascist leader, to be Premier and construct a cabinet.

If the people return a definite anti-Fascist majority at the forthcoming General Election, then the Army will to the charge of the new Government, and the Fascist troops, numbering perhaps 150,000 men, will either have to bow to the popular will or submit to annihilation. If, on the other hand, there is a Fascist majority, Signor Mussolini will remain in power and the regular Army will be at his command instead of his irregular troops.

Why Onions Make us Cry.

In a sense, we are always "crying," and onions only make our eyes weep more rapidly than usual. Our body is perpetually supplying tears to our eyes, and even though we blink these tears are smeared by the eyelid across the ball of the eye in order to clean it.

Onions contain between their layers an acrid oil. This oil is highly volatile, that is, on reaching the air it quickly turns into a vapour and releases a sulphur compound which it contains. This sulphur makes the eyeball smart, and the eye nerves at once signal to the brain for an additional supply of tears, as an added protection against the sulphur. This extra supply is produced so rapidly that it cannot be carried away imperceptibly down the nose in the usual way, but overflows—and so we weep.
