### Hungry Jelly Fish

BREMERHAVEN, June 1 .- (A.P.)-European ichthyologists have become greatly exercised by the diminished numbers of haddock and herring in the North Sea from which England, Holland, Germany and various other countries obtain their principal fish supplies, and several conferences have been held by those interested in the fish industry to consider what steps may be taken to remedy the situation.
