How Powerful an Engine is an Athlete.

Exact studies of the physical exertion put forth by the members of the famous Yale crew of 1924 made by Dr. Yandell Henderson and Dr. Howard W. Haggard, of the Department of Applied Physiology at Yale Iniversity, show that each man developed during the period of a boat ace, about one-half horsepower.

Determinations of the energy expended were obtained in various ways. In one test the men were exrised individually on rowing manes with power meters attached. another, the ratio of the amount oxygen taken in to the amount of bon dioxide given off in breathing determined. In a third the racshell which they used was towby a power boat with, a spring cale in the towline.

The data from these three meds were in general in fair agreeent," says Dr. Henderson. "They dicate that the maximal power exrted is from .45 to .55 horsepower man, or, expressed in the heat valents, 4.8 to 5.9 calories per with a total energy expendio to 29 calories per minute,


