Wolf Killed Near Glencoe.

Glencoe, Feb. 4.—A wolf supposed to have escaped from the park at Belle Isle, opposite Detroit, a couple of years ago and which since that time has been devastating the sheep folds of Mosa Township, was shot this afternoon on the farm of Donald McAlpine by Malcolm McKellar. The wolf was a fine specimen, weighing 42 pounds, stauding 2 feet 3 inches in height, and measuring 3 feet 1 inch in length. It is estimated that the animal had killed nearly a thousand dollars worth of sheep in this neighborhood during the past year, the Township of Mosa alone paying out over seven hundred dollars at a two-thirds valuation for sheep destroyed.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 47 car loads, consisting of 917 cattle, 16 hogs, 130 sheep and 16 calves. The quality of fat cattle was only fair, generally speaking, with few, if any, pro-perly finished lots of either butchers' or exporters.

Trade was inclined to be slow, considering the light deliveries. Prices were much the same as on Thursday last.

Dealers report that prices for the class of exporters that are coming to the Toonto and Union Stock Yards, are too high, and that drovers must buy them lower in the country or be prepared to drop some more money when they sell them. Export steers sold at \$5 to \$5.30 with the exception of one lot of 12 selected from five or six loads.


