1. To promote such tariff reform as will (a) Relieve the consumers and especially the agricultural and wage-earning classes from the burden of taxation that they are now bearing in consequence of excessive vertexistics.

(b) Effectually and speedily accomplish the downfall of the combinations and trusts which have been created amongst many manufacturers, whereby competition is prohibited and monopolies flourish.

(c) And give the preference, wherever practical, to the motherland, and also to such countries, and more expecially the United States, as are willing to join with us in fair trade relations.

2. To prevent in the establishing of provinces in the Territories any enactment of any organic law which would recognize any racial distinction or privilege, and to secure the early repeal of the dual language clause in the Northwest Territories Act.
