TORONTO, June 25—11 p.m.—The low
pressure area over the lake district last
night is now over the gulf district, and
has given showers everywhere east of
Kingston. The weather in the lake dis-

some slight increase in pressure. In the
Northwest there is little change. The
weather remains fine everywhere and
very warm in Manitoba.

FATAL FISHING EXCURSION.

A Tug Capsized in New York Bay—38
Persons Missing.

New York, June 25.—The tug James
D. Nichol left here yesterday with 74
people on board on a fishing excursion.
When the heavy sea struck the boat she
went over, and a number of lives were
lost.

bodies of the victims had been received
there. The list of missing has been
swelled to 36, and it is believed this num-
ber will be increased to 50 or more, when
the names of strangers who were on board
became known.

The Truth About the Schools.

"An organized system of misrepresen-
tation," said a Catholic to an ADVERTISER
reporter to-day, "seems to have been
adopted by the Free Press staff and its
outside help. I said to your reporter a few
days since that the taxpayers of London
sawced at least \$3,000 a year by the exis-
tence of separate schools. The writer in the
Free Press of this day meets this argument
in its usual fashion by stating that the
teachers in the separate school are not paid
enough salary. This is a funny way of com-
bating my contention. 'Citizen,' the
writer in question, has a peculiar way of
juggling with figures, and attempts, by
crooked arithmetic, to prove that a fair
proportion of separate school children do
not pass the high school entrance examina-
tions. In one place he says that 310 chil-
dren from the public school tried the ex-
amination; in another the number is given
at 337, and as this is the number given
where the proportion is taken we must
accept it as correct. It is stated that 233
out of 337 gives a proportion of 75 per
cent. Correct figuring will, however, give
69 per cent. It is also said that 24
Catholic children passed out of 37, giving
a proportion of 65 per cent. The real fact
of the case is that but 36 tried, of whom 24
passed, giving a proportion of 66 2/3 per
cent. Hence the actual proportion
would be 66 2/3 against 69 per cent. In
other places I could name the separate
school children were far in ad-
vance of those from the public school.
There is nothing to be gained by misrepresen-
tation," added the Catholic, "even
when fighting the 'common enemy' and the
'foreign potentate.'"
