THE ROB ROY MINES.

Mr. S. Shannon, superintendent of the Scottish-Canadian Mining Company, of this city, recently wrote to Mr. A. E. Welch, manager of the company, stating that the new tunnel of the Rob Roy mines, that was only started on July 18, was already turning out ore, which was being piled at the mouth of the tunnel ready for shipment. He said that he was sending samples of this ore. This morning the samples came to Mr. Welch. The Advertiser saw them, and they certainly look good. As these samples are actually taken out of the tunnel, it seems to prove the contentions of the owners that the Rob Roy property is no longer a prospect, but a mine. The ore consists of cube and steel galena, containing silver — probably gold. The last assay showed a value of over \$100 to the ton.

HOSPITAL TRUST.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Hospital Trust, which was attended by R. Lewis (chairman), Mayor Rumball, Jas. Gilmour, M.P., Thomas McCormick, T. H. Purdon, C.C., Dr. Niven and Supt. J. D. Balfour, a large number of applications for the position of principal of the training school were received and considered. The trust chose about six of these and Dr. Balfour will communicate with the applicants regarding their fitness. On Friday next the decision will be made.

—Messrs. Glass and Mitchell appeared before the trust. They stated that the apparatus for heating water was too small and that the boiler capacity at the hospital was insufficient. An expert from Detroit and Architect McBratton will be asked to make an examination and report.

The Ministerial Association notified the trust that the Sunday morning services at the hospital would be discontinued until October.

Miss Elizabeth Fraser, of Galt, applied for position on the nursing staff and was accepted.

Collections for July amounted to \$630. Accounts amounting to \$1,606.92 were passed.

The superintendent will advertise for next year's supplies.

SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE

will in favor of three nieces, out Gerald thought that the latter, who was his father's favorite, had intended to disapprove of the proposed action, and did not change the will. Gerald did not know if any other lawyer had drawn a new will for his father. Later in the afternoon witness saw Gerald in the latter's house. Gerald said he had been informed there was another will, and that he had been somewhat worried and perplexed. Gerald said that Edgar Morden was holding a will of his father. Gerald told witness he had gone to James Morden's on June 29 to find where Martin Morden was, and coming back he had told Edgar Morden that he (Gerald) would see Martin and get him to slip out and prevent the marriage, as Gerald thought Martin would not let his girl tie herself to a man three times her age, and who did not treat his other wives well. Gerald said that Edgar Morden had since told him that what he (Gerald) knew, and what he could make up, he could hang Gerald, and unless Gerald would put up a pretty good thing, Edgar would make trouble for him. Gerald had told Edgar that if he said that again, Gerald would make him do it. Edgar did not repeat it, but told Gerald he (Edgar) had another will, by which Joseph Sifton's property went to others. Edgar told Gerald that unless Gerald gave him or the witness to the will 50 acres, or \$2,000, he (Edgar) would make trouble. This was Edgar's conversation, as related by Gerald to witness. Witness advised Gerald not to give Edgar a cent, as it was a case of blackmail, and Gerald could put Edgar through for it. Gerald replied that Edgar would tangle himself yet.

Witness saw Gerald on Wednesday, July 2, for about five minutes. Witness asked if Morden had been told by Gerald again, and Gerald said Edgar told him that Joseph Sifton and Mary McParlane had stayed Friday night at Edgar's house, and the will was made there. Gerald told witness that Dr. McNeil was then in the library, but the doctor did not want witness to know he was there.

The next day, Thursday, July 12, witness and an adviser, who had been made Edgar Morden put his terms and conditions in black and white, to which Gerald replied, "He's too slippery a scoundrel for that." Witness told Gerald he would like to see Gerald and his wife, as Mary well, as she had been more sinned against than sinning, and Gerald said that they would treat her well and keep her with them.

On Monday, July 23, Gerald was wheeling a case of blackmail, and wheeled in. Gerald said he had seen Edgar Morden and told him to go and do his worst. Gerald had heard from others that Edgar was going to make trouble. The same night witness heard that Gerald had been arrested, and he went at once to Gerald's house to see if Mrs. Gerald needed advice or assistance. CHINA IN REGENERATION.

With the pacification of China must come a reform of its whole economic and administrative system. There can be no guarantee for the maintenance of order while corruption runs riot in the palace, and no security against the recurrence of popular outbreaks if the people are to be taxed to support a thieving horde of useless officials. Great as the undertaking of putting new life into the government of China undoubtedly is, there are native Chinamen equal to it, if those who direct the affairs from Peking, or some new capital, do not demand corruption as the first requisite of public service. We must assume it to be possible for a combination of the powers vitally interested in the preservation of China to establish, support and guide a central government which would not be foredoomed to become a prey to its own rottenness. A sound and to progressive system of rule could have been begun two years ago, and all that has happened since has only served to bring out in stronger relief the vital necessity of the reforms initiated by the emperor, and not at all to lessen their practicability.—John Ford, in the Engineering Magazine for August.
