THE NO-RECALL SYSTEM.

THE NO-RECALL SYSTEM.

The news comes from the south that the no-recall or "one up" system of starting will not be used at the New Orleans track, which threw its gates open on Thanksgiving for a 100-days' meeting. "For this much," says the New York Press, "the men who bet on the races are indebted to the wisdom of the managers of the New Orleans meeting. The no-recall system has had a long and thorough trial in the east, and it has been found wanting. From the first it has been the worst kind of a failure. It is productive of scandal and destructive of form. It makes fraud easy, and, while making it easy, destroys all evidence of it. Beyond question, it has been responsible for much of the in-and-out running at Washington, and all of the scandalous gossip which flowed in the wake of that in-and-out running. One correspondent in the latter part of last week wrote: 'Out of 42 horses starting in three races today, more than one-third of the number were left at the post.' The Press thinks that it is about as strong a presentment as possible could be against a style of starting which should not be tolerated on any reputable course. So it would be if it were true, but as it is a lie pure and unadulterated, of course the statement stands for nothing. In the three races, out of 43 horses that were started, only five, or legs than one-eighth, through the stupidity of the jockeys, failed to get off with the rest of the fields. If the jockeys had been fined \$100 apiece they would take care to get away in the future. A system that is alike to all, that is good enough for England and Australia, and every country in Europe, and that minimizes the jockeying tactics when recalls are likely, should be good enough for the united States. Of course, if the starter be incompetent, or absolutely antagonistic, and the jockeys are the same, no system would perfectly fill the bill.
