FOR A TRAITOR

Why Deputy Gustavus Schmidt Was Expelled From the Russian Duma.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.-The Russian Duma has taken the extreme step of expelling from its feld Deputy Gustavus Schmidt, not for Socialism or bomb-throwing-for Mr. Schmidt is more imperalistic than the Emperor himself-but because when a naval captain at Kronstadt in the eighties he sold naval secrets to England and to Germany, was degraded and imprisoned for this offense, and has consequently no right to sit in the Duma. Schmidt originally got into the Duma from Minsk, owing to the support of those pure patriots, the Extreme Right, and also owing to the fact that he told the peasantry of Minsk, who are mostly Russian, that if they returned him as their member he would get the Duma to expropriate for their benefit the estates of the local Polish landlords. After his election the outery against Schmidt became so great, however, that the "Union of Russian Men" decided to drop him, whereupon he tried to join the Octobrists, but they would not ac

Forms Own Party. Then he formed in the Duma what called "The Frontier Union," of which the programme was: unity and integrity of Russia, war against the Polish Kolo, (i. e., the Polish group in the Duma), and its aspirations for home rule," Schmidt induced 40 members from the frontier districts of Russia to join his party. His anger against the Poles was only simulated, of course, for he himself is of German origin, and his experiences as a naval officer had long efore made him a very tolerant cosmopolitan. He simply wanted to create in the Duma such a conflagration of racial feeling that his own little affair would be forgotten. In an adverse report.

Wanted to Fight. Then he became pugnacious and challenged to a duel Baron Meyendroff, the vice-president of the Duma, who had in a speech made some uncomplimentary remarks about Schmidt. But the baron refused to fight with the convicted traitor.


