Willing to Pay the City of London \$20,000 a Year for the L. and P.S. R.

SOME ALDERMEN WERE APPROACHED

But As Yet Little Has Leaked Out of the Negotiations-The Situation to Date.

There have been negotiations, it has been learned, between the city couneil, or at least part of that body, and the Pere Marquette Railway, regarding the extension of the lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway to that

The details of the terms have not eaked out, but it is certain that the company are willing to pay \$20,000 per annum, for the privilege of operating the road for twenty years. They are anxious to give a lump sum or the lease, doing away with the percentage system, as is now in vogue. The present lease calls for \$10,000 a year lease, and a percentage of the

earnings over a certain figure. How It Worked Out. This amounted to about \$6,750 in 1907, although last year it dropped to \$3,500, giving the city a net revenue of \$16,500 in 1907 and \$13,500 last year. Of course, 1908 was an abnormal year, and it is expected that this year the city will receive \$15,000 at least
