PEPPER THOUGHT BODY WAS THAT OF ANIMAL

Some Evidence at the Crippen Murder Trial That Was Favorable to Doctor.

London, Sept. 14.—The Crippen murder trial was continued this afternoon. Dr. Pepper earlier in the day admitted that when he first saw the remains of the woman supposed to have been Belle Elmore Crippen, he thought they were animal remains. It required close inspection, he said, to determine that they were remains of a human body.

Attorney Newton, who is now appearing for both Dr. H. H. Crippen and Miss Ethel Clara Leneve, made the most of Pepper's admission, for it was Pepper who first claimed to have identified the body, as that of a woman who had undergone an operation, and to have found evidence of hyoscin poison.

"I mean to tell the court," Newton said sharply, "that you were able to arrive at these conclusions after first having mistaken the pieces of flesh for those of an animal?"

"Oh, I quickly saw my mistake," Pepper replied. "There was no question after a close inspection that the remains were those of a middle-aged woman of rather heavy build. We eschewed beyond doubt the facts of the operation and of the hyoscin poison."

Lime Had Been Sprinkled.

Pepper said the remains occupied a space under the cellar floor of the Crippen home about the length of a human body. Dr. Marshall, the other analyst, was with him at the time. He said the soil where the body was found consisted of clay and loam mixed, and that lime had been sprinkled over the remains.

Pepper sought to remove all doubt as to the correctness of his conclusions by declaring that the next day, July 15, he and Dr. Marshall held a post-mortem, which eliminated the last doubt as to the remains being those of a woman.

Suggests Dew Loaded Him.

Newton attempted to show that Pepper got all of his facts from Inspector Dew before he made an examination of the body. His questioning grew so sharp that Humphreys, the opposing counsel, cautioned Pepper not to "mind his insults."

Pepper admitted he might have obtained much of his information from Dew, but maintained that he did not know before reaching the Hilldrop Crescent house the age, sex, or profession of the supposed victim.

Dramatists Get Pointers.

The dramatic features of the "Crippen case" are appealing to actors and playwrights as no other case in the history of English criminality ever has. Features of it will undoubtedly find their way on to the stage. This was evidenced today by the appearance in the Bow street court room of Sir John Hare and H. B. Irving, leading English actors, and of Sir William Gilbert, the playwright. They had seats close to the witness stand, and made frequent notes. On two previous occasions, Gilbert was honored with a seat by the side of Judge de Buteux.

Girl Is Breaking Down.

Miss Leneve is rapidly breaking down. Her periods of elation today were always followed by moments of depression. That she is on the verge of a nervous collapse was shown by her convulsive actions, which she made every effort to hide. Her hands twitched constantly, and she turned their way on to the stage. A wardress was kept in close attendance.

During the recess, Crippen and Miss Leneve shared a glass of water and exchanged a few words.

After Pepper left the stand the hearing was adjourned until Friday.

SPLENDID REPORT

The reports of those assigned to visit the children who have been placed in homes throughout the district by the Children's Aid Society are coming in rapidly, and Inspector Sanders stated to The Advertiser today that they are exceptionally fine this year.

"We have received hundreds of reports," he said, "and it is most gratifying to learn that the children who have been placed are doing so well, and that the people who took them are well pleased. After personally interviewing 30 children and their foster parents in the counties of Kent and Essex, Mr. W. R. Baxter, of Chatham, wrote Mr. J. J. Kelso as follows:

"I have just returned from paying a lot of visits to children in different parts of the county. All the homes seem to be particularly good. I wish you could see the lovely surroundings of the majority of the children here, and how they are loved. It has done me a lot of good, and has set me thinking of the children who have been placed in homes. I have been receiving well everywhere and pleasantly invited to call again."

CITY WILL SPRINKLE STREETS AS USUAL

People Are To Be Given Some Return For Their Money.

At the meeting of No. 3 committee of the city council, held last evening, it was decided to sprinkle the streets for some further time.

Some time ago it was discovered that all the money appropriated for this purpose had been spent. There was still a month of sprinkling to be done. In order that the citizens would get some return for their money, it was thought better to sprinkle once a day. This was experimentally tried, and did not prove successful.

"We should sprinkle the streets," said Ald. Jeffries, "Citizens pay for the work, and they should get value for their money. For some years they paid money to the city and did not get value for it. We must sprinkle the streets. If we had the \$800 cut off our estimates, when the rate was struck we would be all right."

A Plumbing Inspector.

The question of naming a plumbing inspector was laid over until Mr. A. H. Van Cleve, the head engineer, looks over the department.

City Architect Nutter explained that in Hamilton the building inspector inspected the plumbing, but he did not do any architectural work.

Mr. Nutter also reported that the roof of the butter and egg shed on the market needed repairing, and the work will be done at once.

Tenders for a 1,000-gallon steam fire engine, and an 800 or 900-gallon oil fire engine will be called for at once. Ald. Ashplant reported that he had visited the underwriters in Toronto, and they had decided to allow the city to purchase a motor fire engine of 800 or 900 gallons capacity.

Other matters of routine were disposed of.

Those present were Ald. Ashplant, chairman, Ald. Fitzgerald, Jeffries, Mayor Beattie, Inspector McCallum, City Engineer Wright, Henry Draney, and Secretary Baker.

MAN GIVES BLOOD AND SAVES WOMAN

Transfusion in an Extreme Case Is Successful at a New York Hospital.

New York, Sept. 15.—Blood from the arm of a robust young man was passed into the arm of a woman who lay at the point of death from acute anaemia at Mount Sinai Hospital on Monday night. The surgeons said the patient probably will recover.

Fannie Kirschen, a middle-aged woman, was admitted to the hospital in a serious condition. Salts of iron, strychnine and other stimulative drugs were administered, but her condition grew worse. The surgeons decided to inject large quantities of a salt solution into a vein in her arm. This also failing, the surgeons decided on Sunday that some one would have to be found willing to give up a quart or so of blood to a young man who would submit to the operation was advertised for.

A dozen or more candidates appeared and one who seemed to be in good physical condition was selected. The surgeons now had to determine whether his blood would mix with that of the patient. It has been found that when the blood of an animal is fused with the blood of a higher animal the latter dies. The same thing occurs sometimes when transfusion is effected between two persons. If this were to happen the patient would die.

By a test called hemolysis, in which a specimen of the patient's blood was added to a small amount taken from the young man's right arm, it was found that as far as that went the operation would succeed. The woman and the man were placed under an anæsthetic side by side on operating tables. The radial artery in the man's wrist was connected with a vein in the woman's arm.

After the operation the man who had given up his blood was placed in bed and allowed to recuperate from the weakness and the nausea caused by the ether. He is all right now. What was his name? Oh, they didn't bother about asking that. He would simply be paid and discharged from the hospital.

SATAN IN NEW GUISE

Drops Horns and Tail For Frock Coat and "Pumps."

Chicago, Sept. 15.—The new style for "devils" was announced last evening.

According to what Dr. A. C. Dixon had to say to a large congregation in Moody Church, the horns, barbed tail, cloven hoof and pointed ears, terrifying makeup which used to form the delineations of the "father of lies" have gone out of fashion.

Instead of these he has put on a frock coat, a silk hat, a white tie, a high collar, and patent leather "pumps" and may be seen cavorting around pink teas and ladies' soirées, looking benevolent and trying to appear intellectual.

Women Falling Victims.

Furthermore, the doctor said, a lot of women are falling victims to his wiles. He is the same "Old Nick" in spite of his efforts to appear respectable. He is trying to adapt himself to modern conditions, and, as evidence of the success of his operation, Dr. Nixon pointed to the large followings obtained by the "spiritualist, theosophist and Annie Besant cults" which, he declared, "were founded by women at the direct instigation of Satan himself."

"Any religion," said Dr. Nixon, "which exalts the physical, the aesthetic or the intellectual, and leaves out the spiritual, any form of worship which deifies a man or ignores him, is a religion invented by the devil for the destruction of man." Women, said the doctor, were particularly susceptible to forms of religion, and, after pointing out that the three cults referred to had been founded by members of that sex, added: "No one admires a good woman more than I and no man is good who doesn't owe much of what is best in him to some good woman, but it is a fact that cannot be denied that women have been responsible for a great deal of what is wickedest in this world."

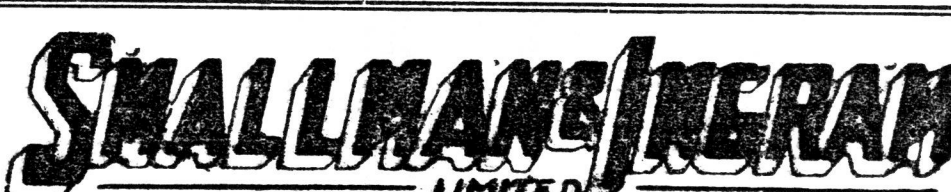

GLACIER HAS BEEN ON FUNERAL MARCH

Ice Mass Nearing End of Journey With Tourists' Bodies.

Paris, Sept. 14.—The people of Chamounix, the little Alpine town at the foot of Mont Blanc, are anxiously watching the great Bossons glacier in its slow progress downward. Embodied in its icy mass are the bodies of J. C. Randall, an American bank treasurer, and five guides, who, with two other tourists and three guides, perished in a snowstorm while climbing Mont Blanc 40 years ago.

The bodies of Dr. James Bean and the Rev. George McCordindale, a Scotch minister, with three guides, were recovered at the time of the disaster in 1870. Mr. Randall's body and those of the other guides have lain in a tomb of ice ever since, and are being carried downward inch by inch. In a few weeks the bodies will be revealed, and an attempt made to recover them for orthodox burial. Miss Edith Randall, the daughter of the dead tourist, has twice visited the glacier in recent years.

MAY SUE OVER G. T. R.

Port Huron, Mich., Sept. 14.—It is almost certain that there will be one damage suit against the Grand Trunk Railway as a result of the wreck at Durand on Aug. 24.

Mrs. Olive B. Cole, grandmother of Clinton Davis, of Montreal, has filed a petition in the probate court here, asking that an administrator be appointed for the estate of the young man. According to the petition the estate consists of "an action against the Grand Trunk Railway for gross negligence."

A BABE FOR \$30

Child Is Said to Have Been Bought to Figure in a Plot.

London, Sept. 12.—A sad story surrounding the death of a four-months' old child of mysterious parentage brought over from Paris, where it was purchased for \$30, was told at an inquiry at Shore-ditch. The child died in the infirmary.

Mrs. Minnie Powney, the wife of a painter, said she took the child over on May 25. She took it from the supposed mother, who said she had brought it over from Paris. Witness asked her \$125 a week for its keep, but Miss Frankel said she would willingly pay \$2 if only she would keep it, as she did not want it. Witness fed the child on prepared barley and cow's milk. Later the child was taken very sick.

In answer to the coroner, witness said she was licensed to keep four children. She pressed Miss Frankel as to the baby, and she admitted it was not hers.

The coroner: "Did she say where she got it?"

"Yes," said she, "she got it from Paris, where she paid the mother \$30 for it."

"Did she give you the mother's name?"

"She did not seem clear on it, but she believed his name was Will Bliss. She told me she met the mother down by the River Seine in Paris, where the mother was going to drown herself and the baby."

The coroner said the child had had a short but exciting life, as it had clearly been purchased for \$30 for the purpose of extorting a large sum of money from a man, which, however,

did not come off, and then it became a nuisance. It seemed clearly a natural death, but it was a very sad business.

BROTHERS' CONFESSION

They Committed a Series of Atrocious Crimes in Germany.

Berlin, Sept. 12.—Two brothers, Karl and Fritz Coppius, who have been for some time in custody in Leipzig, have confessed to a series of atrocious crimes which for long completely baffled the police and caused considerable uneasiness among the inhabitants of the town. The gravest of their offences was the murder of a retired compositor and his wife named Frederick, in whose house one of them had taken lodgings, and whom they wished to get out of the way in order that they might kill and rob a postal official entrusted with the payment of money orders. Luckily for him, their plot was frustrated by the fact that he happened to call in company with another postman.

The brothers have also admitted their responsibility for an attack that was made to kill a servant named Seyfforth, who had been left alone in a house during the absence of her employer. Karl Coppius's confession further covers an attack on a postal official who was felled with a hammer and robbed of a bag containing \$2,250; and an attempt to cut the throat of Frau Wagner, a manufacturer's wife, while she was ascending the staircase of a block of flats to pay a call. The couple were arrested through the promptitude of the publisher, who followed up in a motor-car the messenger whom they had sent to him with a blackmailing letter.

BIRMINGHAM VERY LOW.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—Mr. Robert Birmingham, the prominent Orange organizer, is very seriously ill at his home on Harbord street. Mr. Birmingham has suffered from sciatica since the early summer, and he has grown considerably worse in the past few days. This morning it was said at his home that he was very low and apparently was not improving.
