1890 The Harrisburg Club, of the Eastern Interstate League, defeated Lancaster 24 to 0. The Eastern Interstate was the league in which Hughey Jennings first played professionally.

1890—The Buffalo International League Club was twice shut out by Toronto, the scores being 1 to 0 and 5 to 0. Ledell Titcomb, once a Giant, pitched both games for the Canadians.

1904—The Boston Red Sox, for the twentieth straight time, were beaten, and established an American League record of which President John Irving Taylor, of the Boston Club, is far from proud.

1903—Pitcher Pat Flaherty, of the Boston Nationals, made a home run with the bases full off George Wiltse, of the Giants.
