MODERATOR SPOKE  
AT ST. MARYS MEETINGRev. Dr. McKay Gave a Fine  
Address on Presbyterian  
Missionary Work.

St. Marys, Jan. 30.—Last evening a very successful banquet for the men of the First Presbyterian Church was held in the basement of the church.

The guest of the evening, Dr. R. P. McKay, moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, in his address dealt in the most interesting and respectful manner with the problems of the church as a whole, giving special attention to the matter of missions and the budget as outlined by the assembly for Presbyterians and congregations.

Mr. John Pool gave a fine address, dealing with the impressions he received from the laymen's missionary movement convention held in London in November last.

Mayor F. G. Sanderson spoke of the financial condition of the First Presbyterian Church in St. Marys, and his responsibility in regard to the work outlined by the presbytery.

The speeches were interspersed with musical numbers, consisting of solos by Miss Abbie G. Willard, and violin selections by Mr. Willard.

CATTLE PRICES AT  
TORONTO MARKET

TORONTO, Jan. 31.—Today is marked by another dull market, with practically no good or choice cattle on offer. A large amount of the common and medium butchers that were not sold yesterday are being cleared off today at easy prices. The run of hogs is the only one that is near normal. All the others are almost demoralized. Receipts of cattle are only \$25 head, while sheep and lambs are at most at a standstill. Sheep and lamb prices are about steady at yesterday's quotations. Hogs are unchanged from Monday's opening. Receipts 21 cars, consisting of \$25 cattle, 150 sheep and lambs, 1,200 hogs and 71 calves. Butcher cattle, choice, \$2 10 to \$2 35; do, medium, \$2 10 to \$2 35; do, common, \$1 45 to \$2 10; calves, \$2 10 to \$2 35; hogs, \$1 45 to \$2 10; sheep, \$1 45 to \$2 10; lambs, \$1 45 to \$2 10.

PRICES.—TORONTO, Jan. 30.—There is a good demand here for barley and rye, which are very firm. Wheat scarce and strong in prices. Cables for wheat and corn weaker.

Flour—Winter wheat, 90 per cent patents, are quoted at \$3.60 to \$3.65 at seaboard. Manitoba flour firm, as follows: First patents, \$5.50; second patents, \$5.25; and strong bakers', \$4.50, on track, Toronto.

Manitoba Wheat—Demand is fair, with prices unchanged. No. 1 Northern is quoted at \$1.12, Bay ports; No. 2 Northern at \$1.09, and No. 3 at \$1.05. Bay ports.

Ontario Wheat—Offerings are small, with prices very firm. No. 2 white, red and mixed are quoted at \$1.05, outside.

Peas—Trade is quiet. Good shipping peas are nominal at \$1.15, outside.

Oats—Market is quiet, with prices firmer. Car lots of No. 2 Ontario quoted outside at 44c, and No. 3 at 42c; on track, Toronto, No. 2 Western Canada oats, 49c to 50c, and No. 1 feed, 46c, Bay ports.

Barley—Very little doing, with 48 lbs. quoted as 44c to 45c, outside the city.

Corn—Trade quiet and prices unchanged. No. 3 American yellow quoted at 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c, Toronto freight.

Rye—Receipts limited and the demand at \$1.00 to \$1.05, outside.

Buckwheat—Market dull, with prices firmer at 67c to 68c, outside.

Brum—The market is unchanged. Manitoba bran, \$2.10, in bags, Toronto freight. Shorts, \$2.50.

TORONTO, Jan. 31.—The local grain market shows a slight uptick this morning, with prices unchanged.

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—Weakness at Duane's Avenue and an immense flock of the bulls in wheat. As a result closing prices were at a decline of 1/2c all around compared with last night. Latest trading left corn a shade to 1/2c down, oats a sixteenth to 1/2c up, and hog products increased 1/2c to 1/4c to a dime. Efforts to control the price of wheat were most active at \$1.03 for May. A group of traders who had been at the level and succeeded in rallying the market, but they lacked general support, though the tone at the close was firm. A big decrease in the world's available supply total afforded timely assistance to the bull side. Between the opening and the close, the market fluctuated between \$1.02 and \$1.03 1/2, with last sales at \$1.03 1/2, a loss of 1/4c net. Corn held up surprisingly well in the face of almost record-breaking primary receipts. May ranged from 67 1/2c to 67 3/4c, closing easily at 67 1/2c to 67 3/4c, a decline of 1/4c from last night. Cash wheat was steady. Outside limits touched for May were 51 1/2c to 51 3/4c and 52 1/2c, with the close at 51 1/2c.
