

BYRON FLOCKS MAKE
CLEAN SWEEP AT CHICAGO

Ram Lambs of Lieut.-Col. McEwen
Win All Money—Other Can-
adians Show Up Well.

LONDON STOCKYARDS, Chicago, Dec. 7.—Ontario did itself proud in the sheep classes at the international stock show. In Southdowns Col. Robert McEwen of London, Ont., got first for aged ram, and J. Lloyd Jones of Barford, second. In yearling rams Col. McEwen got first and second. Third went to A. W. Arnold of Galesville, Wis. In class of ram lambs, Col. McEwen captured first, second and third. He got the championship in rams. In the class of ewes one year and under two, W. H. Miner of Chassy, N.Y., was first, and Col. McEwen second and third. In class of ewe lambs the University of Illinois was first and Col. McEwen second and third. In flock Col. McEwen was first, Miner second and Arnold third. In pen of four lambs McEwen was first and University of Illinois second. Among the Oxford Arkell & Sons of Teeswater, Ont., got male and female championship, first for flock and first for pen of lambs. Arkell was first for aged ram and first and second for ram one year and under two, and first for ram lamb.

Shorthorn herds was one of the great classes of the show. Nine herds were entered.

INDUSTRY FOR KINCARDINE.

KINCARDINE, Dec. 7.—At a special meeting of the board of trade a proposition from J. B. Watson to form a joint stock company with a capital of \$50,000, to build a furniture factory in Kincardine, with a floor space of 20,000 feet, and to pay not less than \$5,000 annually in wages, on condition that the town loan him \$25,000 for 20 years, with tax exemption. A committee was appointed to get a more detailed statement as to the nature of the building, equipment and value thereof, and report back at an early date.

GERMAN VERSION
SAYS BUCHAREST
EASILY ENTERED

Resistance Quickly Overcome.
According to Rerlin
Story.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent sends the following official Berlin dispatch which describes the fall of Bucharest:

"At 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning Captain Lange of the general staff was sent as a parliamentary to the commandant at Bucharest, bearing a letter from Field Marshal von Mackensen demanding the surrender of the fortress. A second letter notified the commandant that fire would be opened unless the parlementaire returned within 24 hours.

"Captain Lange returned before the expiration of the limit, the commandant-in-chief of the Rumanian Danube army having refused to accept Field Marshal von Mackensen's letter on the ground that Bucharest was not a fortress but an open town. He declared that there existed neither armed forces nor troops destined for its defense, and there was neither a governor nor a commandant. Captain Lange pointed out the character of Bucharest as a fortress and said that such an evasion would not hinder the German operations. In the course of Wednesday morning portions of General Schmitz's cavalry corps took possession of a fort on the north front and portions of the 8th army corps pushed on and took the line of forts from Chisinau on the west front to Odessa on the north. The enemy infantry offered resistance which was quickly overcome.

"From the south portions of the Danube army pressed into the city through the circle of forts, meeting with no resistance. The troops entering the town were received enthusiastically and decorated with flowers. Field Marshal von Mackensen drove in a motor car to the royal castle, where he was greeted with bouquets of flowers."

HIGH CALIBRE GUNS
TO LESSEN ODDS OF
SUBMARINE MENACE

British Merchantmen Will Be
Better Armed, Says Cable.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The New York Tribune this morning publishes the following from Arthur S. Draper, its London correspondent:

LONDON, Dec. 7.—In the effort to suppress the submarine menace, many British merchant ships are being armed with guns of high calibre, so that the odds against them shall be lessened. In this connection it is recalled that the agitation for sterner war measures that led to the downfall of the Asquith ministry called for adequate measures to curb the U-boats.

If the American Government holds that the increased armament puts merchant ships in the class of war vessels, Halifax will become the chief American port for transatlantic shipping during the war. Britain is able to use her fleet to keep this port clear. Such a change is bound to have a big effect on the port of New York. The arming of merchant ships is a difficult problem, since the mounting of big guns means alterations in structure. Figures show that only one out of five victims of submarines is an armed ship.

The Liverpool Express reports that the German navy assume control of all shipping concerns. It is said that Lloyd George in his conference with the Labor leaders today promised such Government control.

Petrified Body Is
Exhumed in Cemetery

Features Remarkably Clear
After Fifty Years' Burial.

PORT HURON, Dec. 7.—Interred in Clyde Township Cemetery for more than 50 years, the body of a woman, a member of the old Shears family, which was exhumed here today for removal to another part of the cemetery, was found in a state of complete preservation from the knees up. The features of the face, which is now solid stone, are remarkably clear and easily identified.

Workmen in carrying the body allowed it to fall, and the body broke into pieces.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Dr. Henry Vandike, whose resignation as United States minister to The Netherlands was announced last Monday, contributed to the current number of the Art World, under the title, "The Name of France," a three-versed poem glorifying France, and concluding with these lines:

"A name that calls the world to share
The burden of sacrificial strife,
Where the cause at stake is the
world's free life,
And the rule of the people everywhere—
A name like a vow, a name like a prayer,
I give you, France!"

In a statement to a correspondent of the Associated Press at the Hague announcing his resignation, Dr. Vandike said:

"The main reason was my wish to return as a writer, with full freedom to say what I think and feel."

NOW IS PROHIBITED

Germans Have to Grind Their Grain More to Make Up Loss.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Dec. 7.—The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger quotes Stegerwald, one of the directors of the war feeding board, as saying in a speech at Recklinghausen that from January 1 no more potatoes must be used for bread. They will be replaced by more thorough grinding of grain, namely, 48 instead of 81 per cent. The director said that the situation of the food market was such that available supplies would be sufficient for the needs of the country.

RESUMING DEPORTATIONS FROM NORTHERN FRANCE

60,000. Herded Like Cattle in Transit to Germany, Pass Through Liege.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam says:

Deportations from Northern France

have been resumed. Sixty thousand alleged unemployed persons from Lille, Roubaix and Cambrai passed through Liege in the last six days in long trains composed of cattle cars, bound for Dusseldorf, Reims and Essen.

Deportations also have begun in Namur Province, Belgium.

REITERATES DENIAL OF GERMANS GETTING IT

TORONTO, Dec. 7.—"I say without hesitation that the Germans have never got a pound of nickel from the

International Nickel Company since the war began," said Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, regarding the statement of H. Hartley Dewar, K.C., M.P.P., of Belleville yesterday. "Mr. Dewar simply makes declarations as to nickel being diverted, and he produces no evidence, except in the matter of the Merton Company, and that is a matter for the Imperial Government."

"There was a conference of the Provincial and Federal Governments to discuss the matter, and it was decided to put the export of nickel under license, but Mr. Dewar stated in his speech yesterday that nothing had been done."
