RAILWAYMEN AGREE TO CONSIDER PLAN PROPOSED BY WILSON

Brotherhood Representatives
Mum As To Offer.

FOR JUSTICE TO ALL
President Believed To Have
Refused General Increase
With Counter Proposal.

NEGOTIATIONS SUSPENDED.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Negotiations of the union railroad employees for wage increases have been practically suspended until the railroad properties return to the hands of their owners March 1. It is likely that the union will send to President Wilson tomorrow their reply to President Wilson's statement made to railroad labor representatives this morning.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13.—President Wilson today made a proposal to the representatives of the railroad brotherhoods for a settlement of their wage demands, and the men agreed to give it consideration.

Secretary Tumulty declined to say whether the president had refused specifically the wage demands, saying that "everyone wants to settle the strike," and that the brotherhood chiefs should have an opportunity to consider the president's suggestion or proposal without outside interference.

DETROIT, Feb. 13.—Any proposal President Wilson has made to representatives of the railroad brotherhoods in an effort to adjust their wage demands will receive "earnest consideration" by officers of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Shop Laborers, President Allen Barker said today.

expected to issue a statement later in the day.

Meantime there was no intimation whether the president had offered a substitute for an increase in wages in the nature of a continuation of the fight on the high cost of living, or whether he asked the workers to delay pressing their demands until the railroads were returned to the private owners on March 1.

Wilson Read Statement.
Besides Mr. Jewell and Mr. Shea, E. J. Manion, president of the Order of the White House, and read a statement which he had prepared after a study of the report on the wage negotiations presented to him by Director-General Walker D. Hines. The conference lasted about fifteen minutes. The president was in his wheel-chair.

Mr. Shea immediately notified the other union officials who have been conferring with Director-General Hines, advising them to call a conference to consider the president's statement. He indicated that the conference would be continued tomorrow. He said there was no disposition on the part of the union men to act hastily, and that they desired to make a complete examination of the president's statement before reaching a decision.

The president's proposal, whatever it was, was not expected to stay the strike of the maintenance of way employees called for next Tuesday.

The president's statement, the Government's policy was "based on justice to the union leaders," it was presented to the union leaders at the last conference with them. Mr. Hines was understood to have told the men that with the return of the roads to private control under the railroad bill, an impartial tribunal for consideration of their demands would be created.

It is believed Mr. Hines suggested to the president that if an increase in pay were granted the men the roads would seek an increase in freight rates, which would mean increased cost of living. This argument was presented to the union leaders on several occasions by the director-general. It was said, at the railroad administration office, inasmuch as the union are strongly pressing for a reduction in living costs, officials said there was reason to believe that the president had employed this in his answer to the union spokesmen.

Decision Unalterable.
The president's decision was declared to be "unalterable."

He said the Government's policy was "based on justice to all interests." Officials at the White House said it was "a decision containing a proposal."

From this it was assumed that the president had refused to grant general wage increases, but had made a counter proposal to the men.

Notice of Motion to Board
of Education.

FOOD, CLOTHING, BOOKS
Provision To Cover Families
of Four or More
Children.

BRANTFORD, Feb. 13.—Trustee Irwin S. Armstrong of the board of education has given the following notice of motion:

"That pupils passing entrance examination at the midsummer examination and who are members of families of four children or more and whose parents or guardians are not earning more than 45 cents per hour for eight hours per day or 45 hours per week; that one passed pupil be taken care of by this municipal board of education to the extent of the actual cost of food, clothing and books, the same to be determined by this board of education, the pupil to take full course in the public school."

Forty-Seventh Annual Report of The Dominion Savings and Investment Society

TO THE SHAREHOLDERS OF THE DOMINION SAVINGS AND INVESTMENT SOCIETY.

London, Feb. 10, 1920.
The annual general meeting of the Shareholders of the Dominion Savings and Investment Society was held today at 11 a.m., at their offices, Dominion Savings Building.

The net profits for the year amounted to the sum of \$54,978.43. The balance at the Credit of the Contingent Account was \$1,556.82. The usual half-yearly dividends at the rate of 5 per cent per annum amounting to the sum of \$46,744.52, were paid. \$5,000.00 added to the reserve fund, which now amounts to the sum of \$275,000.00, and \$3,233.91 added to the Contingent Account, which now amounts to the sum of \$4,790.73.

The books of the Society have been regularly audited by Messrs. W. J. Harvey and O. C. Barrie, whose certificate is attached to the Financial Statement.

All the Directors retire annually, but are eligible for re-election.

This old man's "mite" gave a new face to the whole canvass. Wellington street workers made a strong effort to reach as many persons as possible yesterday and with this \$25 as a spear-head to their attack they reached the \$7,000 in their \$50,000 campaign. The remainder is easily within sight. All denominations reported today that they would go over the top.

RAISE FOR PORTERS ON SLEEPING CARS IS BOARD DECISION

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—By an award of a board of conciliation filed with the minister of labor today the sleeping-car porters employed by the Canadian Pacific Railway are to receive increased pay as follows:

Sleeping and tourist car porters, \$75 a month for the first year, \$80 the second year, and \$85 for third-year men and after.

Observation, compartment and buffet car porters are to get \$92.50 a month, compared to \$85, the present rate.

The increased rate back to December 16, 1919, and the recommendations made are to remain in effect for one year unless changed at a conference to take place before May 1 of this
