There will be 200 delegates from all parts of Canada in attendance.

HAND BADLY CUT.—John Lewis, 910 Dundas street, was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital Thursday afternoon, suffering from a severely lacerated hand, the result of an accident while at work. OFF THE RAILS

Among the 27 different first aid teams representing various points on the G. T. R., which tried the recent qualifying examinations in preparation for the Chamberlain trophy competition, the London Station team, recently organized, stood seventh highest, with a percentage of 80, it was announced today. The success of this team, which is the more outstanding when it is considered that the majority of the teams have been long established and well experienced, is highly gratifying to both the officials and men of the G. T. R. in this city.

The London team was excelled only by the Montreal shop team, No. 2, heading the list with 88 per cent, by Guelph with 87 per cent, Montreal shop team No. 2, 86 per cent, Turco, 84 per cent, Stratford Roundhouse, 82 per cent, and Stratford shop team, No. 2, with 82 per cent. Out of the 27 teams entered only 14 were successful in obtaining the 75 per cent required to make them eligible for the championship competition.

Just three arrived. In the expectation that at least 100 soldiers from west of this city would come to London today for the opening of the camp on Carling Heights, a special car was added, but this morning rain east-bound from Windsor. Although the train stopped at every station en route, only three would-be soldiers occupied the car when it arrived here.

ORE TRAINS TO START.
The opening of the ore season on the Great Lakes and on the G. T. R. between Point Edward and Hamilton has been postponed until June 23, according to an announcement made today. It was originally intended that the season should open on June 4, but later on June 15, but it has now been learned that the first ore boat will not reach Point Edward until June 23 at the earliest. When the season opens, freight trains will be sent to the local division of the G. T. R., giving employment to many train crews now on the reserve list.

DECLARES WAR

ON "MASHERS"

Will Clear London of "Side-
walk Pests" in the Near
Future.

June bugs and mosquitoes are not the only pests that are bothering London this month, for another kind of pest has come to the fore, namely, the "masher."

These pests have a particular fondness for the fair sex between the ages of 12 and 40, and although they are detested, it is a difficult matter for the persons attacked to get rid of them without using force.

Chief of Police Robert Birrell has decided that he will wage war on the "sidewalk rodents" again, and hopes to have a major success in his campaign last autumn, when London's streets were cleared of the asphalt swarms. He has ordered his men to pay particular attention to the activities of the "masHERS."

For the information of those who are not quite clear on the matter a definition of a "masher" follows: a member of the male sex who is mistaken when he calls himself a man, and who makes a habit of accosting unaccompanied girls and women on the street. There are several species, among which are the kind that wear good clothes, carry powder puffs, and who make their actions plain themselves in a category known as the "he-flapper," and the kind which are not so well dressed, but who loiter around the corners and make nasty remarks when young girls pass, or speak to the girls without being invited to do so.

Claude Niles was fined \$5 and costs in police court this morning for acting in a disorderly manner. He was charged with accosting a young girl about 16 years of age who was walking north on Richmond street to her home at 10:30 o'clock last night. They objected to his forward manner and reported the matter to Sgt. William McCullough. Niles' excuse was that he thought he knew the girl.

SUE TORONTO FIRM

FOR \$35,000 DAMAGES

The Taylor-Campbell Electric
Company Allege Breach
of Contract.

Two more cases, making a total of four, have been set down for the non-jury session of the supreme court of Ontario, which opens at the courthouse on Monday, June 13.

Frederick P. Betts, trustee of the last will and testament of Dr. Henry Augustus Betts is suing John J. Shields, Jessie Shields and Annie C. Shields for possession of certain lands in the township of Mosa. The plaintiff claims that a mortgage on this land was given to the Diocese of Huron by John J. McKellar, that he sold it to James Shields, that the latter died intestate, and that the defendants received the property. It is claimed that they have not paid the interest on the mortgage.

The defendants claim that they are owners in fee simple of the land, and that they have been collecting rents and profits from it. They also say that the plaintiff is barred by the limitations act. Crown, Betts & Coleridge for the plaintiff; Meredith & Meredith are agents for Farley and Shaw of St. Thomas, the defendants' solicitors.

A. T. Taylor and E. L. Campbell, trading under the firm name of the Taylor-Campbell Electric Company, have entered a damage action against the Victoria Electric Supply Company, Limited, of Toronto. The plaintiffs claim that on October 11, 1920, they received a written order from the defendants for a large quantity of supplies. They ask damages for breach of contract in refusing to supply the goods and for the cost of the supplies, and also for goods sold and delivered amounting to \$6,564.52.

They further seek \$10,000 damages for breach of contract, and also for \$35,000 damages for breach of contract to take the whole year's output.

The defendants deny that the plaintiffs sustained any loss or damage by reason of any act or omission of the defendants. The defendants counterclaim \$4770.03. They claim that goods which they purchased from the plaintiffs and sold again were returned because of defects.

SIMS WILL FORWARD REPLY TO SECRETARY

U. S. Admiral Not At All Wor-
ried Over Situation.

London, June 10.—Rear Admiral William Sims said this morning he would reply today to the request of Secretary of the Navy Denby, asking him to inform the United States naval department as to his remarks on the Irish question, delivered here on Tuesday. He said he would not make public his reply.

Admiral Sims did not seem perturbed by reports that the United States Senate had taken action calling for an investigation, but expressed curiosity as to when the Senatorial inquiry would be begun.

"I am returning on the Olympic on June 18," he said. "I don't suppose I could book an earlier passage."

Admiral Sims declared he probably would not make any further statement until his return to the United States. He is busy with a voluminous correspondence, which averages about 70 letters per day from friends in England.

**DECREASE IN NET
DEBT OF DOMINION**

The Income Tax Collections
Assisted in Settling Up
Obligations.

Ottawa, June 10.—Canadian Press.—A decrease of \$1,785,845 in the net debt of Canada during the month of May, as compared with an increase of \$2,813,586 during the same month a year ago, is shown by the final statement issued from the finance department today. The net debt of Canada now stands at \$2,494,802, as compared with \$2,818,586 at the end of April, and \$2,590,548 at the end of May, 1920. The decrease in the debt is accounted for by the fact that income tax collections during the past month totaled \$3,556,711, as compared with \$2,412,802 in May, 1920. This year the tax was collected at the time of making the return, while in 1920 the return was collected at some time previous to the collection of the tax.

The customs revenue for May was \$9,239,964, as compared with \$19,745,200 in 1920. Excise was \$2,990,197, as compared with \$3,778,469 in 1920. Revenue from the postoffice was \$1,600,000, and \$1,550,000 in May, 1920. War tax revenues included \$6,091,874 from inland revenue, as compared with \$2,023,511 in May, 1920, and \$1,548,534 from business profits tax, as against \$1,105,237 in May, 1920. The total revenue during the past month was \$24,413,723, as compared with \$38,175,292 a year ago. Income tax collections are now ahead of expenditures. Ordinary expenditure during the month shows an increase of some \$2,000,000. The total for May was \$1,952,536, as against \$3,959,355 for May last year.

LANGLEY DEFEATED.

Regina, June 10.—Hon. George Langley, minister of municipal affairs in the Saskatchewan Government, was defeated by E. B. Baskin, George Cockburn, independent. This is now conceded. Cockburn has more than 200 majority, with one poll to come. Langley was the only minister to meet defeat. It is thought he may be a candidate in one of the deferred elections.

NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE.

New York, June 10.—Wall Street, 19:30 a.m. Securities prices were resumed at the opening of today's stock market. A few leaders, particularly high-priced oils, showed slight recoveries from yesterday's recessions. On the reduced dividend of the Canadian Pacific, the decline of 1 point, and Atlantic-Gulf lost 1/2. Both Crucible and United States Steels were fractionally lower. Rails and equipments made nominal gains and losses. Prices steadied within the first half hour on buying of Mexican and Pan-American. Petroleum and Baldwin Locomotive, together with a brisk rally in Utah Copper. Exchange on London forfeited part of yesterday's recovery.

1:30 p.m.—Oils, sugars and the preferred shares of several important industrial companies made further concessions to pressure at midday. Atlantic-Gulf and Canadian Pacific were 1/2 points, and American Sugar reacted 2 1/2. Rails, especially the coalters, were moderately strong.
