The report presents three annexes and explains that concerning guar-antees on which Russa's debt will be treated two different solutions were brought forward by the powers represented at the London conference and that no agreement was reached These solutions are printed in parallel columns when differences occur.

Explains Debt Duties.

Anney One explains the duties of These include the fixing of a con stitution and the procedure of the mixed tribunals, also the delivery of New Russian obligations or bonds virtue of the decisions of the mixed tribunals. The succeeding annexes establish

a system for determing Russia's debt, and the proper steps for pre-serving the rights of the holder of Russian bonds or other obligations. Very large powers are accorded to the debt commission, which will be composed of members to be named the Russian government and others appointed by the other powers with an independent president, who will be chsen from the powers or designated by the league of nations. After elaborating the technical details relative to the future handling of the Russian debt the report declares that the soviet government should promise various reforms in ing independence of the judiciaries, and free access to the courts by foreigners, who should be treated on a basis of equality.

Further recommendations stipulate that the soviet permit foreigners to enter and leave Russia in conformity with international practice. Foreigners resident in Russia should have every protection, and the right commercial and technical reasons, as to conduct commerce or professions without discrimination on account of Barcelona, 1921, dealing with the Schanzer, as chairman of the principle.
