WILL RESUME DEBATE ON DECLARATORY ACT

Measure Must Pass Three Stages Yet Before It Becomes Operative.

TORONTO, May 24.—When the Legislature meets again tomorrow afternoon it is the intention of the government that the house shall at once go on with the attorney-general's declaratory bill, which, when given royal assent, will set aside the injunction granted the Ontario Jockey Club to restrain the provincial treasurer from collecting and making immediate use of the proceeds of the 5 per cent race-track wagering tax. The bill, which was the last item of business before the house on Tuesday night, has yet to pass three stages before becoming operative—committee of the whole house, third reading and royal assent.

It is the intention to take the measure through committee and third reading stages tomorrow, and to have royal assent given on Friday.

Once the declaratory act is out of the way the house will resume discussion on Premier Durney's hydro radial bill.

Brief canvass of the Liberal members indicates that the followers of F. Wellington Hay will for the most part vote for the premier's measure.

The session has now reached the stage when members are looking longingly for prorogation, and are inclined to shorten up the remainder of proceedings.

GRANT ARRANGES FOR CONFERENCE

TORONTO, May 24.—With a view to removing some difficulties, which at present hinder the fullest possible development of continuation schools, Hon. R. H. Grant, minister of education, has arranged a conference to be held at the Parliament Buildings on July 5 and 6. He has sent letters to all the county clerks of the province inviting their respective councils to send representatives, and is preparing tentative plans for submission as a basis of consideration.

FORMER MAYOR OF BROCKVILLE DIES

William A. Lewis, Prominent Liberal, Passes After Brief Illness.

BROCKVILLE, May 24.—After an illness of a fortnight, William A. Lewis, president of the board of trade, one of the leaders of the Eastern Ontario bar and former mayor of Brockville for two terms, died last night at his home. For the last few days his death had been hourly expected.

Born at Addison, Leeds County, in 1868, he was educated at the Athens High School, upon graduation from which he taught school in Leeds County and in Toronto. For a year he was engaged upon the construction of the Northern Pacific in Washington and Idaho, and returning to Canada, commenced the study of law at Osgoode Hall, being called to the bar in 1894. For a year he practiced in Toronto in partnership with the late A. G. McLean, and from 1895 until 1901, when he moved to Brockville, he practiced at Athens. At the time of his death he was head of the firm of Lewis and Fitzpatrick.

While still a student he interested himself in politics as a Liberal, and after going to Toronto was for two years president of the Young Men's Liberal Club there. Later he was president of the South Leeds Liberal Association and of the Brockville Liberal Association. In 1900 he was defeated by the late Hon. George Taylor at the federal general election in South Leeds, and in 1907 was defeated by A. E. Donovan for the provincial riding of Brockville.

After serving as a public school trustee and alderman, he was mayor of Brockville in 1919 and 1920, and since then had been president of the board of trade. During his term as mayor he received the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Devonshire, and was chosen by representatives of Eastern Ontario municipalities for a vacancy on the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario. More recently, at the provincial Liberal convention held in Toronto, he received a nomination for the provincial leadership of that party.

FROST DAMAGES GULF LAND CROPS

VICTORIA, B. C., May 24.—Frost has damaged fruit crops on Vancouver Island and the Gulf lands estimated at 30 to 50 per cent of the early bloom, according to the government. In some cases damage was a great deal heavier, the report says.

CONDEMN STAND OF LABOR MEMBERS

Educational Association Holds Twentieth Annual Meeting At Guelph.

GUELPH, May 24.—At the 20th annual meeting of the Labor Educational Association of Ontario, here today condemnation was expressed for municipal officials for preventing free speech, the cities of Guelph, Kitchener, Welland and Toronto being particularly mentioned. The meeting adopted a resolution putting the convention on record as standing for free speech, so long as speakers kept within the law.

There was criticism of the provincial government's policy respecting the construction of highways, particularly with reference to wages and a resolution was passed demanding that the same rate of wages be paid to these highway workers which prevailed in the sections where the work is being done.

A resolution of condemnation of the stand taken by two labor members of the Legislature, Messrs. Horthuth and Swayze, and also of the farmer members who voted for the two bills in the house respecting the London Street Railway and the London gas question was passed, and those labor members and farmers who opposed these bills were given high commendation.

The question of the establishment of a great provincial labor paper was referred to the incoming executive with power to take action in the proposition.

The financial report showed the expenditure during the last year to have been about \$2,000, and there was a balance on hand in the treasury of \$1,233.

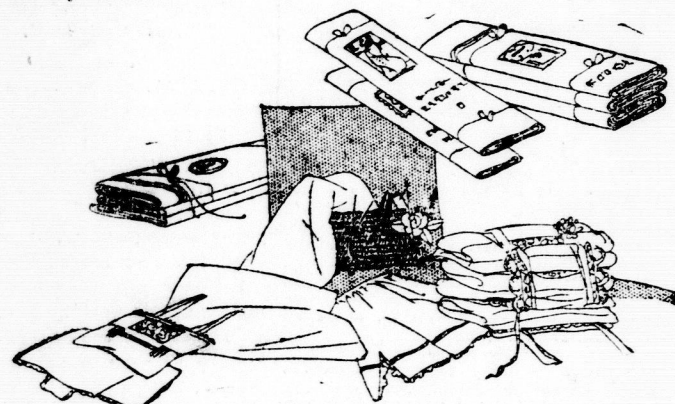

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS IMPORTANT CHANGE TORONTO-WINNIPEG TRAIN SERVICE.

"The National" Restored As Daily Train.

Effective Sunday, June 4, Canadian National Railways will restore daily service between Toronto and Winnipeg via Capreol and Port Arthur. The train from Toronto, No. 3, "The National," will continue to leave at 10:35 p.m., standard time, and train from Winnipeg will arrive, Toronto, 5:15 p.m. These trains will carry most modern equipment of Standard and Tourist Sleeping Cars with Compartment-Observation-Library Cars and Dining-Car service.

Through Standard Sleeper Toronto-Winnipeg, will leave as usual on Grand Trunk Railway train at 8:45 p.m. daily for North Bay, where connection is made with the famous "Continental Limited" from Montreal for Vancouver and Pacific coast points so that the daily services through Port Arthur or Cochrane offer a pleasing choice of routes between Eastern and Western Canada. CLAIMS SLIGHT DROP FOLLOWED EMBARGO

Minister of Agriculture States Meat Fell One Cent a Pound.

LONDON, May 24.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Sir A. Griffith-Boscawen, minister of agriculture, replying to a question asked in the House of Commons last night in regard to statements that the admission of Canadian store cattle would cheapen the price of meat in this country, and whether there was any appreciable increase in the price of beef in the years following the first imposition of the cattle embargo in 1892, said there was no evidence

showing that the price of store cattle determined the price of home-killed beef, which was mainly governed by the price of imported beef.
Official statistics of meat prices were not collected when the embargo was first imposed, the minister said, but the records published in trade papers indicated that the average price of beef at the London Central Market during the five years following 1892 were a half-penny a pound less than in the previous years.

COLONIAL REVENUE

Hon. Winston Churchill Declares Finances Larger Than Usual.

LONDON, May 24.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, furnished the House of Commons today with figures relating to the finances of the colonies and protectorates, showing that their revenue in the last financial year before the war amounted to £26,356,000, with expenditures of £26,187,000. For

the year 1920 or 1921 the revenue had swollen to £32,513,000, and expenditure to £31,750,000. Loans issued by the colonial governments in the ten-year period from 1904 to 1914 totalled £26,565,000, and since 1914, £37,950,000.

All the colonies, said the minister, are still able to meet ordinary administration expenses from revenue, but not extraordinary expenditure.
