The Canadian author, Mr. Moorehouse eplained, is forced into exile by lack of a Canadian market. That means lack of Canadian magazines sufficiently strong financially to pay more than a pittance for exclusive product; lack of populated centers large enough to support numerous bookstores; lack of distribution channels for reaching a scattered popula-

bookstores; lack of distribution channels for reaching a scattered population; lack of publicity and thereby apathy upon the part of the Canadian public; lack of the habit of reading among the people at large.

"A Canadian story as approved by the American editor and sensationalized by the American motion-picture director, is a distinct type—just as there is the Western type, the underworld type and so forth. It is full of beautiful white snow, wilderness scenery, half-breeds and whiskey-runners, dog-trains and mounted policemen who can wear wrong uniforms and salute at the wrong time without being one whit less handsome.
