



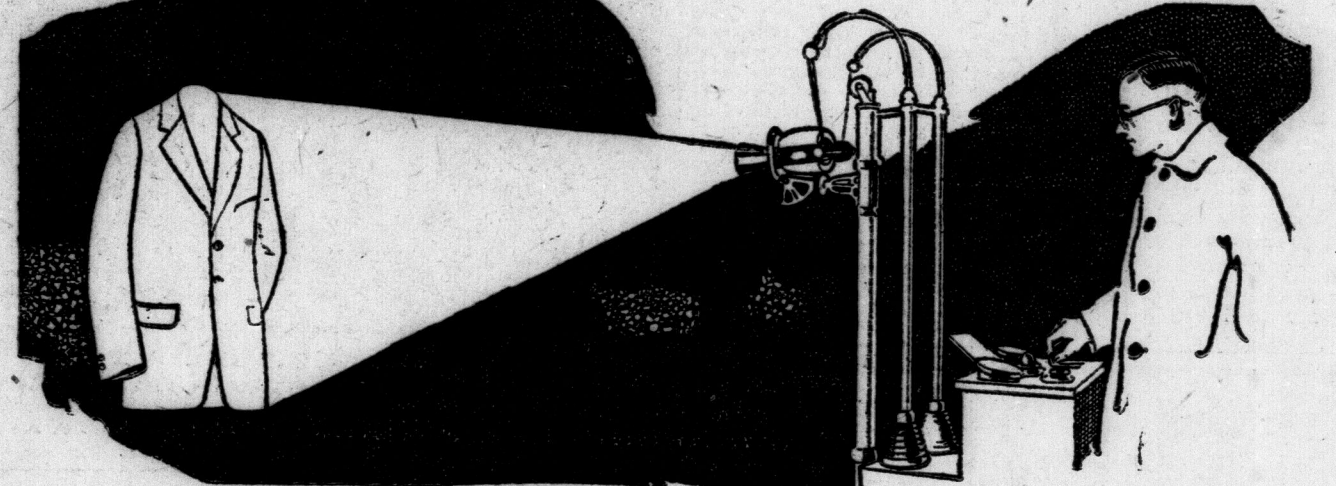

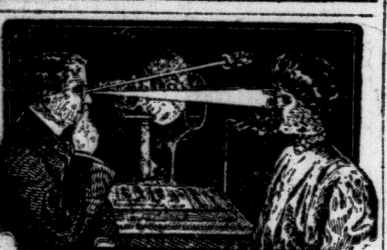

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TAX NEWLY-WEDS FOR TIME SPENT IN SINGLE BLISS

Court of Revision Members De-
cide Not To Give Exemption
For Full Year.

HEAR RAY LAWSON

Judge Agrees To Determine
Whether Applicant Is Town-
ship Resident.

Once again the assessment com-
missioners of this city, backed by the
court of revision, has taken steps
to increase the revenue of the city
through the taxation of incomes.
This time it is the man, newly en-
tered into the bliss of married life
who must suffer, for no longer will
he successfully claim exemption for
the entire year in which he took the
eventful step.

Hitherto the flourishing of a mar-
riage license was sufficient to in-
duce the court of revision to grant ex-
emption up to \$2,000, but all rules of
the game were changed yesterday
afternoon at a session of the court
presided over by T. W. Scandrett,
who worked under the watchful eye
of Mayor George Wenig.

He arrived early and registered a
protest when one young bridegroom
was granted the usual exemption.
The mayor did not think it was good
business. He claimed that anyone
during the year just ending should
pay up for the time during which he
enjoyed single life.

Mr. Scandrett informed him that
the court was following a precedent.
It had always been customary to
grant exemption for the full year, he
said.

Nothing developed until a dozen
or more cases in this category had
been settled and then the mayor
again arose to the occasion. The mat-
ter was discussed briefly and then
the court decided that anyone mar-
ried during the year should pay a
tax for the months previous to his
marriage.

Idea Not New.
The idea was not an entirely new
one as far as the assessment com-
missioners are concerned. For some
time H. J. Bennett, chief of the as-
sessment department had been en-
deavoring to have such a plan
adopted. At his instigation a bylaw
providing for just such cases has
been drafted and will be brought up
at a meeting of the city council on
Monday night.

The new ruling will mean a con-
siderable saving for the city, as a
large number have been granted
exemptions in the past. Several who
claimed exemption today will be
dealt with under the new ruling, but
any who were granted exemption
earlier in the year will be granted

Council Dissents On Plan of Raising City Salaries

Ald. Burdick Opposes Increase Without Request From Em-
ployees, While Ald. Hayden Opposes Suggestion As Unwise.

It was the same old story in the
city council last night. The members
could not vote "intelligently" with
such information as they had at their
disposal, and the long-heralded "sur-
vey" of city hall salaries has been
again deferred indefinitely.

And in the meanwhile all alder-
men will be furnished with a com-
plete list of the employees, their
wages and length of service. It is
quite evident that they propose to
consider the question in detail, as
every departmental head will be re-
quested to furnish a list of those
whom he recommends for increases.

The council will retain the right
to make any further recommendations,
which may not be included, and
which they may consider seasonable.

Requests Pay List.
"Have you the Post Stanley pay
list?" Ald. Colbert asked Mayor
Wenig as his salutory remark last
night.

"I expect it by midnight," replied
his worship, but everyone thinks
he was joking, and if it comes to
light they will be agreeably sur-
prised.

"We should have all the pay lists
here in order to be guided in our ac-
tion," Ald. Colbert urged.

"We can't deal with the L. & F. S.
salaries in any event," cautioned Ald.
John T. May.

When Ald. Hayden suggested that
the departmental heads submit their
recommendations, Ald. George
Burdick felt that while these cases
were no doubt deserving, he was op-
posed to the elevation of salaries
without request.

exemption under the old law.
Ray Lawson, through his solicitor,
Jared Vining, appeared before the
court to establish a claim for ex-
emption from a city income tax. He
stated that, as a resident of the
county and not of the city, he should
pay his tax to the Township of Lon-
don. Judgment was reserved.

Mr. Vining explained to the court
that Mr. Lawson was a resident of
the township in every sense of the
word, for he lived there with his
family during the greater part of the
year. During the winter months Mr.
Lawson lived with his mother at 191
Cheapside street as a boarder.

"I don't believe in it unless a re-
quest comes from the employee," he
explained. "If you ask for recom-
mendations for increases you will
have everybody in the hall entered."

Ald. Hayden could not view the
situation in this light, however. "That
is just how you lose a good man,
sometimes," he advised. "By waiting
for a request he'll go somewhere
else. A one-dollar increase given
without asking to a deserving case
is worth more than three dollars."

Ald. Gordon Drake urged action
without delay, pointing out that they
could at least deal with the assess-
ment department employees with
whose wages they were familiar.

This was ruled out, the others in-
sisting that all increases would be
made retroactive to the first of the
year.

The industrial area project was
promptly passed back to the city
council again for final approval. Ald.
May registering lone exception to the
proposal, while Ald. "Ernie" Shaw,
the latest addition to the council,
voted in the affirmative.

Several items of a routine nature
were considered and disposed of, and
the usual discussion of the city's
parking regulations was staged.

to exemption on the grounds of being
a resident of Montreal.

"There is no intention on Mr. Law-
son's part to evade the tax. It is
merely a matter of fixing his place of
residence. If the court decides he
lives in London he is perfectly willing
to pay his tax here. Mr. Lawson,
however, maintains that he does not
live in London, and therefore should
not be taxed here.

"There will be no trouble when
his place of residence is decided
upon. The amount he is to pay will
be settled with the assessment com-
missioners. The \$70,000 income named
is of course absurd."

Mr. Bennett explained to the court
why he had assessed Mr. Lawson.
"Mr. Lawson lives in Montreal where
he had charge of his firm's business.
In time, however, he moved to this
city, and after living in a rented
house for two years, went to live
with his mother. Three years ago,
he purchased the Shaw-Wood estate,
except for three or four months in
the winter time, during which he re-
sides with his mother. His home in
London is the only one he possesses,
and he keeps it open at all times."

Mr. Vining explained that business
keeps Mr. Lawson in Montreal a con-
siderable portion of his time. When
in that city he lives at a home which
he keeps furnished. Because of this,
Mr. Lawson had originally laid claim

out now it would result in a hardship,
as the firm was about to build a new
building. The court could not grant
an extension of time, but as the
judges saw justice in the claim some
steps will be given to relieve
the firm from paying a full tax on
the property.

Many other cases involving small

SCOTLAND ALARMED BY CATHOLIC INFUX

General Assembly of Church
of Scotland Tackles
Matter.

London, May 29.—The Church of
Scotland is much concerned over the
invasion of Scotland of Roman
Catholics from Belfast. A special
committee at the general assembly of
the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh
today went so far as to declare that
the influx is becoming a menace to
the Protestant religion.

The incursion particularly has been
in the West of Scotland industrial
area, but the movement is spreading
to Edinburgh and Dundee.

A resolution was passed at the as-
sembly meeting today urging the gov-
ernment to appoint a commission of
Scotland with regard to the large
preservation and protection of Scot-
tish nationality and civilization.

Recently a report was issued by
the general assembly of the Church of
Scotland with regard to the large
Irish Catholic population in Scotland,
and it declared that it was incumbent
on the Scottish population to con-
sider the grave situation in their na-
tive land before it was too late.

DOCTORS ARE SUMMONED TO ATTEND SOVIET CHIEF

Copenhagen, May 29.—Several
prominent doctors were summoned
hastily to attend Nikolai Lomine on
Sunday, according to a despatch from
Moscow. The physicians were re-
quested to remain in the Kremlin.

Leonid Krassin, Soviet trade emis-
sary to London, is to succeed Vorow-
sky, who was assassinated at Lau-
anne, as Russian representative at
Rome, according to Moscow reports.
Krassin will leave as soon as the
Anglo-Russian differences are
straightened out.

CHANCES FOR RELEASING PRISONERS ARE BETTER

Tientsin, May 29.—Despatches from
Tsao Chwang today strengthened the
impression of an improved atmos-
phere in the negotiations for the re-
lease of the fourteen foreigners held
in bandit strongholds on Pootzuiku
Mountain.

Chinese officials evidently are mak-
ing a more sincere effort to placate
the bandits, and the bandits have
been quick to acknowledge this.

ASKS ATONEMENT HAVING APPEAL TO HUMAN REASON

Rev. G. Kersey Draws Fire of
Rev. D. McCamus Before
Conference in Sarnia.

Sarnia, May 29.—The first open
session of the London Methodist Con-
ference held tonight in Central Church
was marked by a warm discussion
following the lecture on "Practical
Atonement," given by Rev. George
Kersey of Tilbury, before the theo-
logical union of the address.

In rapid attention for an hour by the
address, in which the speaker ex-
pressed his opinion that it was neces-
sary to formulate a doctrine of a
practical atonement which would ap-
peal to reason. Mr. Kersey, in deliv-
ering his paper, said he was giving
utterance to statements which he
consistently believed to be true, and
to which he had given serious thought
in the content of his speech.
