

Western Ontario Boards of Trade Seek Ways To Improve Maritime Trade

BETTER BUSINESS IS AIM OF BOARDS

Propose Sending Representatives From Western Ontario To Eastern Provinces.

SPECIAL MEETING

To increase interprovincial trade, representatives of the chambers of commerce should enlist the aid of the federal government. The representatives should also go to the Maritime Provinces and meet the representatives of the Rotarians and Kiwanians and the chambers of commerce for an interchange of interprovincial thought.

Maritime delegates could in return visit Western Ontario to formulate plans for an increase in trade. Such were the plans outlined by members of the United Boards of Trade of Western Ontario at their special meeting in the rooms of the chambers of commerce at the Tecumseh Hotel yesterday afternoon.

Further suggestions were made that the government provide transportation for the delegates, since the members of some of the boards of trade and chambers of commerce were in a position to defray their own expenses. It was pointed out that a businessman going to the Maritime Provinces for the benefit of interprovincial trade should not be expected to give both time and money.

Proposals were made that members get in touch with well-informed men of the Maritimes and enlist the aid of newspapers as well as the government. A suggestion was made that the chambers of commerce work out the problem independently of the government, as well as with its aid.

The Crow's Nest Pass situation, arising out of the resumption of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement, came up for discussion. A committee was appointed to represent Brantford, Stratford, Windsor and London to acquire information to protect against the existing situation and to secure particulars from other communities affected.

The committee will report to the secretary to bring the proceedings up to date.

Coach Settlers.

A proposal to enlist the aid of retired farmers for the coaching of immigrant settlers in the methods of Canadian farm work was taken up. It was suggested that a meeting of municipalities and township councils and county organizations be held this fall to discuss the idea, and that a program be submitted to deal with the question.

Robert Greene emphasized that the immigrant needs directing when he arrives in Canada. He need not know all about farming, but he had the muscle necessary to do the work. There was a necessity for instruction in Canadian farming methods.

Motor License Question.

Gordon Philip, secretary of the chamber of commerce, stated that the distribution of motor licenses from a central point. He said that the motor club should have the revenue from the motor licenses. It was pointed out that directing tourists who visited Ontario. This was no small task. It involved considerable work and one from which the club derived no benefit.

Mr. Philip said that were the licenses issued from Toronto there would be delay and confusion for London motorists.

Robert Green thought that Toronto would be satisfactory as a point of distribution. London had been the point for handling the work but there were other points in Ontario that did not have the same facilities.

It was decided that it would be a good idea to have a standard tourist bureau along with the issuing of motor licenses.

Report Is Given.

The report of the annual meeting of the Western Ontario Boards of Trade showed that the following matters had been taken up: Aid for medical research, tax conference, Canadian coal for transient traders, business tax for transient traders, workmen's compensation act, standard information bureau for tourists, Chicago drainage canal and other resolutions.

Obituary

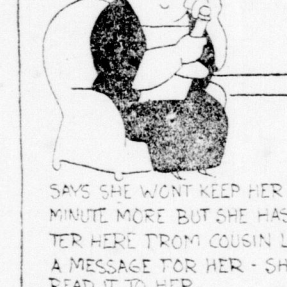

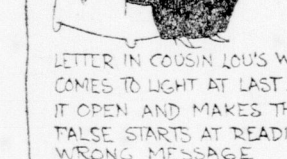

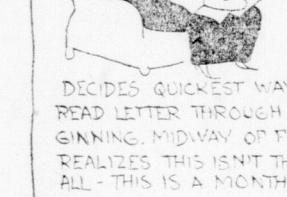

THREE SENTENCED ON THEFT CHARGE

Two Go To the Reformatory and One To County Jail.

PLEADED GUILTY

Stratford, Aug. 8.—Three young men appeared before Magistrate Makins this morning for sentence on charges of breaking and entering automobile service stations and stealing accessories both here and in Bothwell. Victor Shantz and Herbert Olles were sentenced to eight months in the Ontario reformatory on each of three charges, sentence to run concurrently, and an indeterminate period of not more than two years, less one day. John Wood was sentenced to two months at hard labor in the Stratford jail on each of two charges, sentences also to run concurrently. The boys pleaded guilty to the various charges, and elected trial by the magistrate.

They are Ken Lindsay, Ken McFarland, Miss Rose Saunders and Miss Frances Talbot of Thames; Ken Hunter and Miss Marjorie Drew of Queens; Jim Kennedy and Miss Leona Kirkwood of Birkett's; Miss Ernestine Partridge of Riverview; Miss Marie Loughlin of Simcoe; Nelson Sumner and Miss Jessie McFarland of Brantford; Bill Wanless and Miss Helen Barbour of London.

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
