He came to this country from Scotland in the year 1862, and, with odd jobs, has lived here since. Years ago he was an industrious, well-to-do man, but of late all ambition seems to have left him. He has been drinking about doing things in hotels for drink or a meal, and is well broken down in health. He says he is tired of life, and seemed to feel aggrieved that he was not allowed to die. He is 63 years of age and a perfect wreck physically and mentally. He has no living relative in the country and is destitute. On

Friday last he threatened to do away with himself, so it is evident that he has been meditating self-destruction for some time.

Although the Chinese are gradually wasting away, they seem to be very cheerful and energetic, and expressed, in their own way, the warmest thanks to their visitors. They all look well, considering they are lepers, and are quite satisfied with their home. The steamer left about 1:30 o'clock, and the party had a delightful trip home, the water being quite smooth. Wild ducks were very numerous about the lazarette, and Captain Clark, on the way home, made some crack shots at several.
