Endowment Plan Explained in an Address By Lady Minto.

Eleven Hospitals Have Been **Substantially Aided** Thus Far.

As has already been briefly referred to in Ottawa despatches, Her Excellency the Countess of Minto requested some of the business men of Ottawa, to be good enough to meet her at Government House on April 8, at 3 o'clock, in order to secure from Ottawa assistance towards this object. In response to Her Excellency's invitation the following were present: Hon. W. C. Edwards, Mr. Justice Burbridge, Mr. G. H. Perley, Mr. John Manuel, Mr. H. K. Egan, His Worship Mayor Cook, Mr. F. W. part: "I must thank you very heartily for having found time to attend this meeting. I was most anxious to show you by the map the work that has been accomplished. The red crosses mean towns employing Victorian nurses, the red spots, hospitals in operation, the blue spots, places demanding our assistince to enable them to build a hospi

Two years after Queen Victoria's death, I appealed to the country to contribute towards these memorial hospitals; about \$26,000 was raised, and with this money we have assisted the districts which were considered most in

with this money we have assisted the districts which were considered most in need of hospitals.

THE NEW HOSPITALS.

"I should perhaps explain that a good deal of thought was given by competent judges in the selection of these places. In most cases the money for the building in party raised in the district, and the maintenance of the hospital guaranteed; the necessary grant was then given to complete the hospital—this varies according to the need of the place, from \$500 to \$3,000. The first year or two the hospitals may need a supplementary grant to help to pay the nurses' salary, but generally the hospital is able to be maintained from the patients' fees, and local contributions. Ten hospitals are now in working order; out of this number one at Pictou belongs to the government, one at Fort William has been lent us, and a beautiful one at Copper Cliff has been affiliated to the order. Four hospitals will be opened this spring at North Bay, Kaslo, Swan River, and Red Deer. We have now 68 Victorian nurses, some employed in nospitals and the rest engaged in dis trict nursing.

The eighteen towns that employ these nurses raise their funds locally to pay these salaries. Six localities are aided by grants provided by the Ontario gov

Massacre of Two Hundred men at Ergbane in Northern Manchuria.

Russians Tell of Storming a Fort and Killing All Occupants.

News was received by the Empress of China that reports had been received by Japanese papers from Tientsin of the massacre of 200 Chinese placer miners at Ergbane, in Northern Manchuris, by Bussian troops, who attacked the miners and shot them down—the affair being considered a small edition of the Blagovestchensk, massacre, Later advices received from North China give the Russian version of the massacre. According to Russians, parties of Chinese horsemen descended on railway stations about the end of March. The horsemen attacked the railway stations at Pogranitchnaja, Selenche, Mazichel and Muren, in which district the Sixth Siberian foot regiment is stationed.
