### ALL CIRCUMSTANTIAL

But the Crown's Case is Growing Stronger.  
**MRS. HYAMS WILL BE A WITNESS**

The Skull of the Victim to Be Produced in Court.

Evidence as to the Placing of the Evidence in the Hyams Case is Being Developed. The Bank Account of Martha Wells Shows That the Insurance Money Was Transferred to the Hyams Bros.—What It Is Expected to Prove by the Evidence of the Medical Men.

That the Crown made no empty boast in stating that the strongest evidence in the Hyams murder case is being reserved until the last was proven before the conclusion of the third day's proceedings of the preliminary examination of Harry F. Hyams and Dallas T. Hyams at the Police Court yesterday. The faces of the prisoners brightened considerably when Dr. King stated, under cross-examination, that he believed the boy's death was accidental, and that it was caused by the weight. They fell again, however, when Samuel Wainwright, who for five years prior to May, 1892, had used the host every day, swore that it would have been an impossibility for the weight to have slipped off the iron hook, which attached it to the rope.

While the evidence of the insurance agents who wrote up the policies on the life of young Wells was more favorable to the defense than anticipated, indicating as it did that Wells was perfectly cognizant of the large sum which was being placed on his life, the third day's evidence was less favorable to the accused than that of the two preceding sessions of the court. The trial will be resumed this morning, when it is expected the wife of Harry F. Hyams will be called to testify. The skull of the dead boy will also be brought into court, when the surgeons conducted the preliminary examination of the crown expert testimony. That testimony, which was given yesterday, will prove that young Wells was not killed by the weight falling upon his head.

The five counsel for the defense are exhibiting every possible ingenuity in their claim that when their side of the case is heard many of the suspicious circumstances brought out will be easily explained.

Evidence as to Motive.  
A side point came up for discussion when the case opened at 11 o'clock. The Crown called H. E. Patton, an employe at the Young-street branch of the Imperial Bank, to the witness stand. He testified that he had seen Harry Hyams at the bank, and the disposition made of her money. He stated that he attempted to introduce a large number of cheques, showing in all over \$20,000, paid to Harry Hyams. Mr. Patton objected to the evidence on the ground that developments subsequent to the trial of an act could not be introduced as proof of the original motive, since the motive had then ceased to exist. The magistrate, however, held that if a man does something in anticipation of an event occurring at a later date, and the event does occur, the evidence thereof can be introduced as proof of motive. The Crown's contention was that the money was introduced as a bribe to the doctor, who was engaged to be married, and would subsequently come into the hands of the money. The proof that they did so was the money was therefore evidence as to the motive.

Thought it was an Accident.  
The cross-examination of Dr. Edmund R. King, who was summoned to the Colborne-street warehouse immediately after the tragedy, was then proceeded with, in which the doctor again related the position in which the body was lying on the floor. Half an hour was occupied in discussing whether the wounds on Harry Hyams' body were occasioned by the hands of a man in contact with the cold and frosty weight in lifting it from young Wells' head. Witnesses admitted that there was a fire on the first landing, and also said that the wounds might have been caused by the weight slipping from the hands of a man and cutting his fingers to the bone. The doctor said there was no blood on the floor, and that he was not in the circumstances surrounding the tragedy to lead him to conclude that the weight had not accidentally fallen on the boy's head. "Why, then, did you send for a coroner?" asked Mr. Curran. "Witness replied that he simply concluded there were only two ways in which the body could have been cut, and he did not feel justified in giving a certificate of death until an officer of the Crown had investigated the facts. He had no suspicion of foul play, and he was not a doctor, but a witness. The body there were no gloves on the hands, although when Expressman Fox saw the body a short time afterwards he says he saw evidence of a scuffle or of disordered clothing on either side of the prisoner, nor did he notice any spectacles lying around."

In support of his contention, that the weight could not have slipped off the rope, the Crown called Robert Wright, a plumber, who had been intimately acquainted with young Wells. The morning after the tragedy Wright examined the Colborne-street warehouse and visited the elevator and weight. From his examination he could not see how the weight could have become fast in the casing, or how the hook could have slipped from the weight, although when he tried to remove the hook it came out quite easily.

### TARIFF POLICY FUEL.

General Herbert's Return Not Looked For—Hudson Bay Railway Contract Approved—Administration of the Fishery Laws—J. W. Tyrrell Expected to Go to Killisnoe Land for the United States.

Ottawa, March 1.—According to advice which reached the Department of Trade and Commerce to-day, there is a good opportunity for Canada available in opening up trade with Jamaica. The department has received an official copy of the speech with which the Legislature was opened on Feb. 15. It contained this reference to the trade with Jamaica: "The withdrawal of the Government of the United States from the reciprocal arrangement with this colony entered into in 1891, and the re-imposition of the duty on sugar leaves us free to restore to our tariff some of the sources of revenue abandoned under that arrangement. A bill will be submitted to you dealing with the subject."

In view of this position of fiscal affairs in Jamaica, it is felt here that the present is a most opportune time for negotiations looking to the conclusion of a reciprocal trade arrangement with the island. The action of the United States Government above referred to has taught Jamaica a practical lesson as to the instability of trade relations, and a lesson which they are not likely soon to forget, and an experience which they are anxious to avoid. It is believed that the Government are pressing for a speedy decision in regard to their claims for construction of the Government cruisers Constance, Curlew and Petrel.

Renewing the W. Steamship Subsidies.  
Another circumstance which enhances our prospects of success is the fact that very shortly the time will have arrived when it will be necessary to renew the Dominion subsidies to the steamship line now running between Canada and the West Indies, in fact the matter is understood to be presently under consideration by the Government. While the United States is doing nothing to promote international trade, the Government of the Dominion is practically displaying its anxiety to build up commerce with Jamaica. Moreover, it has been suggested that in the event of a reciprocal trade arrangement with the island, Jamaica sugar is now admitted to the fullest extent of its power. Hon. L. H. Turner, the Minister of Finance of British Columbia, comes to England shortly to make a new British Columbia loan and the promoters expect he will give such pledges of the Government's aid as will enable the British Pacific Company to be put before the public here. The British Pacific Company will reach the seaboard, according to present arrangements through connecting with the much-talked-of and much-criticized Atlantic and Lake Superior route.

It is feared in colonial circles that the question of privilege which yesterday compelled the Government to withdraw from the Lords the bill to enable Canada and Jamaica to enter into a trade arrangement, will seriously retard this outcome of the Ottawa Intercolonial Conference. The officials of the Dominion of Commons objected that the bill, which affected the customs duties should begin with the Dominion of Commons, and that it should be initiated in the Commons. The Government will introduce the bill into the Commons, but it is expected that the bill's passage are not bright.

FRANCE'S TRADE WITH CANADA.  
French Government Seeking Information How to Increase It.  
Paris, March 1.—The French Government has deputed to General Dumont, who served in Quebec, and is now in London, to visit French ports and give information likely to develop France's trade with Canada. The Bordeaux Chamber of Commerce has published Mr. Hanotaux's letter assuring Lord Dufferin, British Ambassador, said he had not yet received proposals to exchange ratifications of the Franco-Canadian treaty. Mr. Hanotaux expressed the opinion that despite this delay, the treaty would soon become operative.

### GOVERNMENT HOUSE ABOLISHED

MAINTAINING THE LEAD IN THIS REFORM.

The Legislature Passes a Resolution That With This Year the Appropriation for the Maintenance of the Government House Will Cease—The \$10,000 Salary Must Suffice for Everything.

Winnipeg, March 1.—The Manitoba Legislature yesterday discussed a resolution to appeal to the Dominion Government to abolish the Government House. For this reason the following amendment was adopted and carried, with only two dissenting votes: "This House is of opinion that the present Lieutenant-Governor, after the incumbency of His Honor shall be determined by the salary of a new appointment to the office, and that in no case should any expenditure be made on the said account after the termination of the year 1895."

This means that the Manitoba Government will contribute nothing in future for the maintenance of Government House. As it costs \$5000 yearly to heat and light the present Government House, it will be seen that the next Manitoba Government on a salary of \$10,000, is likely to be out of pocket.

The possible outcome will be that the Government will be obliged to purchase a more modest and less expensive private residence.
