Collection of Rentals By Province Instead of Dominion

Is Proposed. WOULD AID EXTENSIONS

E. V. Buchanan Points Out Where Revenue Was Overlooked.

Plans for facilitating the extension of the hydro service to farmers as out-lined by the Hydro-Electric Commission are made public to-day. The plan would involve the diversion of horse-power rentals from the Dominion to ovincial Government. This would raise the necessary revenue, it is beposed. The report of the special legisns have raised such a furor throughout the province, show that the On-tario Government already has the power to collect rentals from private hydro development companies, but that only a fraction of the possible revenue, according to their report, was collected last year One company, it is shown, was liable for more rentals than was collected from the 34 other private power development companies in the province. Rental charges range from

25 cents to \$2.00 the horsepower. Two outstanding accounts are shown in the special committee's report. The Ontario Light and Power Company, on the Montreal River, are rental of 25 cents the horse power. That company's maximum development is 4,000 horsepower, and a total of \$1,000 in rentals was collected last year for 1919. The Abitibi Pulp and Paper Mills, as Iroquois Falls, has a maximum development of 22,000. There are 4,800 horsepower actually developed. 
