SELL PICTURE RIGHTS OF BIQ MATCH RACE

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—Motion picture rights in connection with the matched race between Samuel D. Riddell's Man O' War and Commander J. K. L. Ross' Sir Barton at Kenilworth race track next Tuesday, were disposed of to-day. It is said, by Toronto interests, which arranged the race, to D. W. Griffiths, American film play producer, for \$10,000. This is said to be the first time motion picture rights for a horse race have been sold.

ST. THOMAS COLLEGIATE TAKES FIELD DAY HONORS

Rugby and Basket Ball Teams
Both Win From London—Annual
Event Proves a Great
Success

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 5.—(By Staff Reporter)—A cloudless sky, accompanied by cool breezes and one of the largest crowds on record, are a few of the factors that contributed toward making the big annual field day of the London and St. Thomas Collegiate a huge success here to-day. There is no doubt but that it was the most successful field day ever staged. From the opening of the athletic events at 1:30 until the last merry-maker had left for home to-night there was not a single mishap to mar the proceedings.

LONDON LOSES.
Just how it happened no one exactly knows, perhaps it was the extra training administered by H. G. Feasby, but the fact remains that the Forest City visitors were defeated both in basket ball and rugby. In the latter it was a complete shut-out, the final score standing 23-0 in favor of the locals, while the girls piled up a score of 14-8 in the basket ball event.

The London girls had only one week's practice and every player was a new one picked from the scattered whereabouts of the London Collegiate, while the St. Thomas team had played together for four years or so. The vanquished promise to beat St. Thomas in the return game on Friday, October 15.

WELCOMED AT STATION.

Soon after 1 o'clock the city was invaded by the merry-makers. A crowd of the St. Thomas students went to the London and Port Stanley Talbot Street depot to welcome their London friends, and as soon as they disembarked from the train a procession was formed, followed by a march to the Athletic Park.

The blue and white and the yellow and purple colors were everywhere in evidence for the remainder of the day, but the most spectacular feature of the day was the monster parade of all students, both London and St. Thomas, which formed at the conclusion of the rugby game. It was headed by the St. Thomas team and both victors and vanquished marched through the city to the Y. M. C. A., where a banquet

had been prepared. The rugby enthusiasts remained at the Y while the girls took their basket ball friends to the Collegiate, where a similar banquet had been prepared. A brief toast list was disposed of at each place, at the conclusion of which the guests went to the Star Theater.

FEW ROWDYISTS.

The crowd was exceptionally well behaved, according to Chief Armstrong and other members of the police force. They were all out for a good time and those who did not go to the theater made merry by parading the street. There were some who attempted a few of last year's pranks, but they were soon quieted by their more sensible companions, so that the warning of the magistrate and police had its effect.

The ball used in the rugby game was very kindly donated by R. H. & J. Dowler and was much appreciated by the boys. "Fat" Potts certainly showed his fellow rugby experts how to pose when the camera man snapped the team. "Fat" was very much in evidence throughout the entire day's sport and starred brilliantly in the rugby game.

John Lane, the tallest youngster in last year's line-up, was missed in the rugby match to-day. Despite his long legs, John was always able to create trouble for the opposing team. His place will be well filled, however, by a newcomer.

A smashed windshield on a new sedan was the only serious accident at the day. This was caused by a "misplaced ball" in the rugby practice. The

damage was repaired and paid for before night and no one was injured.

THE RUGBY MATCH.

Through fumbles St. Thomas was able to gain great runs by their back division. Moody, running over 30 yards, made a clean touchdown behind the goal. Johnson booted three kicks into the dead line. Billy Johns made a wonderful run, again getting a touchdown through his brilliant playing.
