He holds the present world's record for three miles with a turn, 19.01, and has made the three fastest marks. Jake is a big man, built like a Greek statue. Everybody who is anybody who visits Orillia sees Jake before they leave. So when Mr. Meighen was there to open an hospital or something, Bob Curran and a couple of others ran him over to Jake's place at the Narrows. In the ex-champion's old boathouse are yet preserved the immense sculls that he used on the Thames River when he defeated Stanbury, of Australia, for the world's rowing crown. Every Orillian holds these in reverent regard.

Of course, the boathouse was visited, and, of course, the historic oars were exhibited. Somebody asked Jake to "palm" one of them. This is a trick the old oarsmen have, and few there be who have the strength of wrist to accomplish it. It consists in taking hold of the oar by the handle and extending it straight out from the shoulder in line with the arm. Jake obligingly performed, and Bob (who, with Jack Gray, brother of George, the world's champion shotputter, as a double sculls partner) won the championship of America twice—he also held out the oar.


