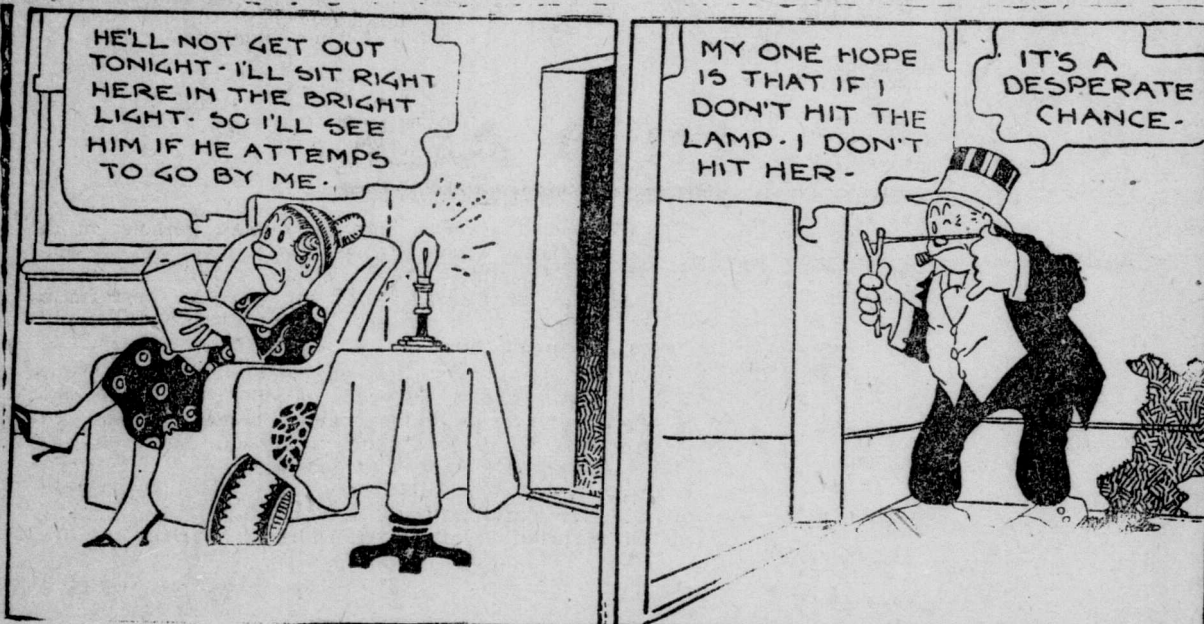

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NATIONAL RIFLE HONORS GO TO COLONIAL CADETS

ASSOCIATION, Oct. 28.—The National Rifle Association has issued the results of the competitions for the Imperial challenge shields, in which with medals and over \$46 sterling in prize money, presented by Lieut.-Col. Deer Haunts Beckon and Hunters Willingly Respond

One week from to-day the big game hunters will nearly all begin their luck in Northern Ontario. The rush to get packed up begins to-day, as most of them plan to be on their way not later than next Thursday in order to place their foot upon the deer and moose haunts by November 5, the first day of the open season.

Many of the regulars among London and Western Ontario hunters have held meetings of their respective parties. Lists were prepared to provision the campers, each member of a party having to do with the securing of a certain portion of the requirements and the hunters are now busy preparing for the annual deer hunt. To the ordinary individual, who knows little about such preparations, it must seem rather an arduous task, but the work, great as it may seem, is accomplished with such dispatch that those unaccustomed to the ways of the sportsman have but a short time to prepare for the hunt.

Enthusiasm as displayed by the hunters is second only to the undying and hopeful spirit and persistence that goes to make a man a sportsman. Confidence also plays an important part in the make-up of the hunter and to find all these qualities attained by an individual means the discovery of a most proficient big game hunter.

WANTS NEW LAID EGGS.

Year after year the parties who leave the city for the two weeks of the silent North gain from experience of past seasons just what is required. And in looking over the list of requirements of one of the parties, who propose to hunt their game along the Magnetawan, one that the whims and desires of every one of the party will be cared for. Even to the individual appetites, and the hunters insisting upon the transport of new laid eggs and fresh creamery butter is not overlooked. Another must have his pork chops. This particular party has placed a ban on pork and beans, though this brand of food is generally taken as an essential by many.

TAKE PLENTY BEDDING.

Last winter the above party found that it had not provided enough woolen blankets and it proved a source of disturbance to the cook as he was compelled to keep his boots on while resting for fear some chilly member huddled up in the scanty bedded bunk would insist upon him keeping a roaring fire in the big box stove all night.

Some of the hunters have become pastmasters in the way of clothing in a day's outing. The shoe packs and the woolen sock and the specially built and designed underwear and outer clothing are as important as the "pet rifle" and its deadly ammunition. No fear about the latter being overlooked.

Fresh fish for the table, caught every morning, necessitate that the cook be able to go to the bait pit and with the tackle, which one of the party had not forgotten, then proceed to the stream, where he finds it as easy to catch "whoppers" as he buys bread at that point.
