One near the Muncey Station M. C. R., between townships of Carleton Place and Delaware, consisting of two spans each 125 feet C to C, and two spans each 60 feet C to C, 16 foot roadway; the other about 5 1/2 miles south of Glenora, G. T. R., consisting of one span 240 feet C to C. This bridge is to be designed for a solid concrete roadway 16 feet wide. At the same time tenders will be received for Concrete Substructures for the above bridges.

Construction of Drainage Works

Sealed proposals addressed to the Engineer in Charge and endorsed on the outside "Proposal for the Construction of the Petite Castore River and Annable Creek Drainage Works," will be received until 12 o'clock noon, of

MARCH 15th, A. D., 1902.

The work consists of the improvement and extension for drainage purposes of the Petite Castore River and Branches in the Townships of Mountain, Winchester and Russell and requires the excavation of approximately

384,500 CUBIC YARDS OF EARTH

12,380 CUBIC YARDS OF ROCK

and the supply of material for and the construction of the Road Bridges in the Township of Winchester, as well as the removal of all obstructions in the shape of trees, stumps, stumps, etc.

Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check or cash, payable to the Treasurer of the Township of Winchester, for 5 per cent of the bid. In case the proposal is accepted the deposit will be retained until the contract is duly signed, when it will be returned to the contractor and bonds taken in the amount of 15 per cent of the contract price as a guarantee of the faithful performance of the work.
