DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.—ORDINATIONS.—On the 30th ultimo, (Trinity Sunday), the Rev. WILLIAM N. BOYEN, St. Bees College, England; the Rev. JOSEPH ELLWELL; and the Rev. RICHARD STRONDS, A. B., King's College, Windsor, N. S., were admitted to the order of Priests, by the Lord Bishop of Fredericton, in St. Anne's Chapel, and Mr. WILLIAM H. DEVEBER, A. B., King's College, Fredericton, was ordained a Deacon.—St. John, N. B., Courier.

JERUSALEM.—APRIL 8th.—On Good Friday, an interesting ceremony was performed at the Chapel of the English Consulate. The Bishop, assisted by his chaplain and two Missionary clergymen, baptized five Jews; three men and two women. A considerable number of English were present; but the service was read in German by Dr. Nicolayson and the bishop. It was curious to hear our gracious Queen prayed for in a foreign language. "Wir bitten dich für unsere gnädige Königin Victoria." The bishop, Mr. Gobal, a native of Switzerland, is a fine serious-looking man, and read, with great solemnity and impressiveness, our beautiful Liturgy, which lost less than one would have supposed from being rendered into German.

The little church, of a pretty Gothic design, has got its walls up, and is waiting for the roof, which, though constructed of timber, is to be brought out from England, so scarce is that material here. The highest point of Mount Zion, crowned with an English Protestant Church, is an interesting subject for contemplation. The hospital, established by the Society for Promoting Christianity amongst the Jews, and attended by Dr. Macgowan, stands hard by, and is a most serviceable institution.

In a letter addressed to Mr. Reynolds, the Secretary of the Home and Colonial Infant School Society, the Bishop says, "the Armenians here and the Syrians are very kind and friendly, but the Greeks are cold and reserved. The Patriarch has not returned my visit. I am looking for the position which the Lord may assign to me respecting them."

Local and Political Intelligence.

IRELAND AND AMERICA.—The Belfast, (Irish) Northern Whig, relates the following incident, as showing how the generous conduct of America, in sending relief to that country is appreciated: "A poor American sailor, who had been found guilty of smuggling tobacco, was sentenced to a fine of £100: The sum was afterwards reduced by the Board of Customs to £2. But it was much the same to the man, as he had not £2 to pay, and he continued in gaol. The circumstance having been mentioned on 'Change,' the sum was at once raised, and steps were taken for the immediate liberation of the man. This, though comparatively a trifling matter, is a pleasing indication of the feeling entertained towards the Americans.—Boston Christian Witness.

CAPTAIN WARNER'S LONG RANGE.—The alleged invention of a destructive agent of extraordinary power and extent of application which has repeatedly excited great public attention by experiments made for the purpose of testing its value, has been recently subjected to a test which was to decide the question of the government's adopting or rejecting it; and the result of it has been declared, by Sir H. Douglas, in the House of Commons, to be that the invention "turns out to be the greatest imposition ever practised upon public credulity and gullibility."

EMIGRATION OF IRISH PAUPERS AT LIVERPOOL.—A deputation from Liverpool which waited upon Sir George Grey, at the commencement of May, stated to him that since the 15th of January last 180,000 Irish paupers had arrived in Liverpool: of that number 40,000 or 50,000 had emigrated to the Colonies, and others had proceeded to different parts of England; but there remained from 60,000 to 80,000 in Liverpool, in addition to the ordinary number of Scotch and Irish in that town. It does not appear that any legal means exist for remedying this serious evil; but to prevent the spread of infection from the diseased state in which some of these emigrants are found, various measures have been adopted—such as an order for steamers which have sickness on board to hoist the yellow flag, upon which they are to be inspected by medical officers, and the sick removed to certain lazaretto ships which Government has given up for that purpose: the owners of vessels bringing passengers to Liverpool are also warned that it might become necessary, if they do not use precaution as to the state of health in which their passengers are found, to detain them for the purpose of performing quarantine before they land any passengers.

PIENONT; MOST CERIS.—It is reported that the cutting through this mountain, for a railway from Turin to Chambery, has been fully decided on, experiments having demonstrated its practicability.

REVOLUTION THREATENING IN TURKISH DOMESTIC LIFE.—Though the "Queen's Drawing Room" is now a week old, yet there was one circumstance so singular and so remarkable, so significant of the times, that it will bear to be the subject of gossip between us even now. It is no less a fact than the Turkish Minister actually bringing his wife to Court, not shrouded and veiled up to the eyes, to screen her from the profane gaze of "dogs of Christians," and hurried secretly into the presence of a female sovereign, but hanging on the arm of her ottoman lord, and threading her way through the diplomatic crowd in a court dress, not distinguished from any other lady, though the minister, of course, appeared in his national costume. Just fancy the old Tories of Constantinople hearing of this dreadful innovation. There's an end of the constitution of Turkey at once; and a pretty account the princess will give, when she gets back among the secluded inhabitants of the harem, of the privileges she has enjoyed.—Cheltenham Looker-on.

AUSTRIA.—The Archduke Charles, uncle to the reigning Emperor, and celebrated in the military history of his country as the skilful and patriotic commander of his armies, though seldom successful in the wars with Napoleon, died on the 30th of April. He retired from the command subsequently to the disastrous campaign of 1809, and consequently had no share in those glorious events which terminated in the debilitation of the French Emperor.

Rome.—The Univers says—"Our letters from Rome announce that Cardinal Gizzi, on the 19th ult., addressed to the governors of the Roman provinces a declaration that his Holiness desires to unite around him an assembly of men of note, delegated by the principal towns in the Roman States. A letter from Civita Vecchia informs us that this declaration of the Pontifical Government excited in that town the liveliest demonstrations of joy. It was generally believed that the proceeding would produce the same impression throughout all the States of the Church."

CHINA.—The Chinese Repository gives an account which could hardly be credited had we not positive proofs of the density of the population of the Chinese Empire. According to the above journal, published by the American missionaries, a civil war, or rather feud, took place between the two neighbouring departments of Chang-Chao and Tseuen-Chao, in the Province of Gokein, in which 21,515 houses and 668 huts were pillaged and burnt to the ground, and 130,638 persons killed or wounded. It appears that wars of this kind are of frequent occurrence in the interior of this country, without the Government attempting, or rather caring, to interfere. It is stated that when riots of this description take place, bearing no political character, the authorities care little about the results to the inhabitants. It is not long since that the authorities of Canton allowed two villages to be destroyed, and the population murdered, as the question was only certain losses at gaming. The empire, say they, is too thickly populated, therefore there can be no harm in allowing turbulent people to make room for a more quiet set.—Monteur Delge.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.—Certain papers, detailing the unsuccessful negotiations which have taken place, since Lord Elgin's arrival, for the purpose of introducing some gentlemen of French origin into the Executive Council, have been laid before the Legislature. There is a report of negotiations being resumed.

The address of the House of Assembly, in answer to the Governor General's speech, has at last been carried. Mr. Baldwin's amendment against Ministers being negatived by a majority of two votes only in favour of the ministry; the following is the vote:

It will be perceived that Mr. Draper voted with the majority; he has, however, since signified his acceptance of a Judgeship, which will vacate his seat. Messrs. Attorney-Generals Badgley, East, and Sherwood, West, and Receiver General Macdonald have all gained their elections and their votes are included in the above.

It might be hoped that personalities, which have taken up so much of the time which has passed since the meeting of Parliament, will now give place to the transaction of business. But the very limited majority which has sustained the Administration on the address renders it somewhat doubtful whether the business of government will be successfully carried on in the present state of affairs.—We cut the following from the Morning Chronicle, having reference to the loans to be granted to sufferers by the late fires to enable them to proceed with building:

In answer to a question from Mr. Chabot, Mr. Cayley explained, that when the bill was passed last Session, authorizing the Ministry to borrow £100,000 at 5 per cent. it was supposed that money could be obtained at that rate; but the state of the money market, since that time, had been such that Canadian Debentures at 5 per cent. could be obtained at less than par; so that it was found impossible to borrow the money at that rate. The Ministry, therefore, proposed to introduce a bill, giving them authority to pay 6 per cent. And as the former bill gave authority to loan the money at 3 per cent, or 2 per cent less than it was supposed it would cost; so now they intend to ask for authority to make the loan at 4 per cent, thus preserving the same proportion as before.

A series of want-of-confidence Resolutions is to be moved in the Legislative Council on this day.

The Hon. R. E. CARON.—A handsome piece of plate has been presented to our late Mayor, bearing the following inscription which explains the occasion and the design of this act of respect and goodwill towards him:

"PRESENTED TO THE HONORABLE RENE EDOUARD CARON, Speaker of the Legislative Council of Canada, by his fellow-citizens of both origins, as a token of their high personal esteem and approbation, as well of the uniform suavity and benevolence, which have marked his intercourse with society, as of his public conduct and zeal in the discharge of his official duties, while Mayor of the City of Quebec, during a period of ten years."

BOARD OF HEALTH.—The City Council have voted £250. to this board; and the Board has assigned 10s. a day, Sundays and Holydays excepted, for the service of its Secretary. The Board recommend that a convenient lot of ground be appropriated for the reception of the filth, manure, &c., which may be removed from the yards, streets, wharves, &c., and that it be prohibited to deposit the same in any other spot;—also that some place or places be procured where water carters may at all times procure clear water for the use of citizens; and that they be prevented from taking water any where else.

We are very thankful to find that Dr. Sewell moved, seconded by Mr. Phillips, and it was

Resolved.—That a Committee of five members be now chosen to memorialize His Excellency and the other two branches of the Legislature, in the strongest possible terms, upon the absolute necessity which exists for the speedy establishment of a General Hospital in this city, and that a draft of a petition to the same effect be prepared to be signed by the Mayor and Corporation, Clergy and Citizens of Quebec in general.

The following gentlemen were appointed to form said Committee: Mr. W. S. Sewell, Dr. Sewell, Messrs. Phillips, Sirois and Dr. Jackson.

MUNICIPAL.—The City Council have been much engaged in deliberations referring to measures for

the health of this city. A letter from A. C. Buchanan, Esq., Chief Agent for Emigration, calls the attention of the Corporation to the number of Emigrants of this season remaining in this city, and occupying lodgings in the more densely populated parts thereof, but chiefly in the Lower Town, and represents the danger which may result to the health of the citizens generally.

Certain citizens of Quebec having petitioned the Council to provide against the intended erection of temporary sheds for the accommodation of the sick, near the Marine Hospital, a resolution was passed, on Friday last, upon motion of Mr. Rousseau, seconded by Mr. Robitaille,—not without amendments being offered in favour of the locality of the intended sheds near the Marine Hospital—to this effect: "That a By-law be immediately passed to prohibit the erection of any temporary building within the limits of this city, for the reception of sick Emigrants."

This resolution was, however, rescinded at a meeting held last Monday, after the following, moved by Mr. Maguire, and seconded by Mr. Hall, had been adopted—two adverse amendments having been negatived by 10 votes against 7.

"That this Council has witnessed with satisfaction the efforts being now made by the Commissioners of the Marine Hospital to afford hospital accommodation to strangers and emigrants arriving sick or who may fall sick within the city, by the erection of temporary sheds on the vacant ground adjoining the principal building, where the sick will be liable to participate in the benefits of the able and successful treatment received by persons admitted into that Hospital."

QUARANTINE STATION.—The increase of accommodation on shore, by the erection of additional sheds, has raised the number of sick on the island to 1700; several hundred remained on board vessels. The number of vessels was 25, nineteen of which had only just arrived. The following extract of a letter from Grosse Isle, dated 14th inst., is from the Gazette:

"Our Bishop is here, and has gone through every ward and tent, and witnessed every horror. He goes back by our station packet to-morrow. He preached at my camp on Sunday. I assembled the Protestants under shady trees, where service was performed."

The new ship Ringfield (G. H. Parke & Co's), which left here on Friday last, has a cargo of flour equal to 12,500 barrels.

Ship Clopatra, from Quebec, spoken with by Brig Vine, on the 6th, was going into Sydney, making 3 feet water per hour.

Ship Loosthank, Capt. Thain, 636 tons, from Liverpool to Quebec, out 7 weeks, 349 passengers when she sailed, had lost 117 by death, and only 5 of her crew were able to work: letter from Chatham, 3rd June, says she requires assistance, to bring her up the river.

Brig Exmouth was totally wrecked on the coast of Scotland, and of 251 persons she had on board, nearly all Irish emigrants, every soul, except three of the crew, were lost. She sailed from Londonderry for Quebec, on Monday, the 26th April, and was soon after caught in the storm which raged with great violence on the Scotch and Irish coasts. She was driven amongst the rocks at Ballanave, on the north-west side of Islay, when she soon went to pieces. Steamers Lady Colborne and Pioneer came into collision on Wednesday night, last week: the Pioneer's steam-pipe broke, and loss of life ensued. The Montreal Correspondent of the Mercury says: "The Captain, Pilot and Engineer of the Lady Colborne have been committed for wilful murder on the Coroner's Warrant, for running down the Pioneer and occasioning the loss of some people who were aboard of her."
