Excellent Way to Dress Flannel Haddies. The art of cooking flannel haddies is not generally understood. It is usually boiled, by which means a great portion of the fish is rendered uneatable.

Scald them in salted boiling water, rub them with lemon juice, and boil 3 minutes; wipe them; dip them first in cracker dust, then in eggs (2 cupful milk mixed in 2 eggs, and season with pepper and salt), then again in cracker crumbs.

Some Auxiliaries to Pure House Air.

In securing a pure household atmosphere there are many important desiderata. The main drawback with them being the well-known difficulty of renewing the fresh air in the room to replace that carried up by the chimney, in sufficient quantity, without causing some drafts of air.

Some More About Hams.

Grated Ham.—Cut chunks of very well done ham and trim off the fat, grate on a large grater and serve in a salad bowl. The under part of the ham grate best; it cannot be satisfactorily made from scraps.

Ham Breakfast Dish.—One pint of bread crumbs, one pint chopped ham. Mix together, moisten with a little water and melted butter, and add pepper.

Ham Patties.—Scald one pint of milk in a pan of boiling water. Add half a cup of flour, and when it is melted add half a cup of butter made into a smooth paste with cold water.

Economical Ham Omelet.—Fill a cup with bread crumbs and cover with milk. Beat three eggs very light and mix with the soaked bread.

Ham Sandwiches.—Chop fine scraps of boiled ham, mixed with a little made mustard, and spread between thin slices of bread buttered with soft butter.

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buy a slice at the market, boil it thoroughly, and prepare as above. This is often a great convenience.

To Garnish Ham.—1. Dot the top with black pepper, or make a leaf of some other device by sticking cloves into the ham. Put a frill of white paper around the hock and garnish the dish with parsley.

2. Take the skin off carefully in one piece. Have a pattern of any design you fancy—an ivy wreath is pretty, or anything much perforated, so as to show the white of the fat ham underneath, place it on the skin, and cut the design with a pair of scissors or a pen-knife.

3. Outline from a pattern a small heart on top of the ham. Cover it with minced red beets, and around this put a row, one inch in width, or white of egg boiled hard and run through a coarse sifter; it will look something like rice.


