COMPARABLE EXPENDITURES ON ENGLISH AND FRENCH TALENT

Hon. Maurice Lamontagne (Secretary of State): Mr. Speaker, in answer to the question directed to me yesterday by the hon, member for Port Arthur (Mr. Fisher), here is the gist of the statement made by the C.B.C. in that connection.

During 1963 the C.B.C. paid fees amounting to \$14,770,920 to artists of all categories.

According to press reports the president of ACTRA, an organization representing English speaking artists and writers blamed the C.B.C. for allocating to its French language radio and television services two thirds of the expenditures occasioned by fees.

Here are the facts as shown by C.B.C.

records:

Of the total amount paid to all artists by the C.B.C. last year, about 60 per cent went to the English service and almost 40 per cent to the French service.

Fees paid to artists, excluding musicians, were as follows: 56 per cent for the English service and 44 per cent for the French service.

The proportion of fees paid to all artists, except authors and musicians, were as follows: English service, 55 per cent, and French service, 45 per cent.

With regard to authors only, excluding musicians and other artists, the proportions were 57 per cent for the English service and 43 per cent for the French service.
