## MOTHERS ALLOWANCES

## COMPENSATION FOR PERFORMANCE OF FAMILY DUTIES AS A CAREER

**Mrs. Grace MacInnis (Vancouver-Kingsway)** moved:

That, in the opinion of this house, as a measure to promote the development of family life in Canada and to prevent its erosion, where a mother chooses to make a full time career of motherhood by remaining at home instead of taking gainful employment outside, the government should consider the advisability of providing such a mother with an allowance to enable her to fulfil this service to Canada.

She said: Mr. Speaker, there is a growing concern in Canada these days about the way in which the pressures of industrialization and urbanization are threatening the Canadian family. It is not my intention to belabour this particular point, because I think we are very familiar with it because of what we have read in the newspapers and magazines, from what we have heard over the air, and so on.

Possibly the most concrete expression of this concern has been the setting up, within recent months, of the Vanier Institute of the Family by our much beloved late Governor General and his equally famous and beloved wife, Madam Vanier. This institute of the family will be devoting its efforts to inquiring into circumstances which make family life what it should be and also circumstances, I understand, which militate against good solid family life in cases where it breaks down. I think there is no lack of evidence that people are concerned about the need to do everything possible to protect family life
